HYPERION TO-DAY

NOTHING in the nature of a Turf miracle happened to the first of the classics yes-terday. Colombo won, as everybody expected he would, but it was hardly in the old Colombo style, and he will not be a hotter favourite than before for the Derby as the result. In-deed, it will not surprise me if he is easier to back now than he was before he went out for yesterday's race.

Colombo's behaviour in the paddock did not inspire confidence. He was quiet enough but obviously ill at ease by the mobbing he re-ceived, and sweat rolled off him while he was being saddled. There was an incident, how-ever, that showed the absurdity of the rumours that he had turned savage. When the lad brought a sponge he opened his mouth and showed the gentleness of a retriever while being refreshed.

At the Gate

As he left the paddock he was still sweating Sightly, but there was no fault to find with him then when he got into action. At the post he was one of the few to cause a slight delay, and when the field went off in two groups he was certainly not out of the gate in the same style as he had been at the Craven meeting. Valerius and Flamenco led him on the far side, and of those near the stand Bright Bird and Haytime both appeared in front of him for the first two furlongs.

* * * Long before they had gone half way, how-ever, the favourite nad taken the place he was expected to hold much earlier, and at five furlongs, with Mcdieval Knight beaten, it looked like being Colombo first and the rest looked like being Colombo first and the rest nowhere. Then came a shock. Instead of going right away Johnstone became so uneasy that he began to feel for his whip. Badruddin was obviously worrying him, and on his left the French colt, Easton, was putting in some great work.

Easton's Effort

Going into the Dip there was not a length between the leader and Easton, who continued to be such a menace that Johnstone found it necessary to show Colombo the whip. That was sufficient to persuade him to pull out enough to beat the French colt by a length and all was well, even if he had left us a bit breathless with apprehension.

But if Colombo only got there after a somewhat desperate effort, what can be said of Medieval Knight, who was never in the picture and finished eighth? Obviously it will have to be Lo Zingaro if Beckhampton is to upset Colombo at Epsom, but I think that if yesterday's winner does prove another Orwell, the Derby winner will probably be Umidwar.

The Aga Khan's colt has grown into a fine-looking individual since his two-year-old days. There is no fuss and bother in his make-up, and still a good bit below his best in condition, he was good enough to hold a good place all the way yesterday, and finish close up fifth. In every way it was a most satisfactory per-formance, and I feel sure that Umidwar is going to make it warm for Colombo when they get to Epsom.

Thrilling Match

A thrilling finish which caused almost as much excitement as Colombo's victory pre-ceded the big race. There were only two run-ners, and odds were laid on Loosestrife to beat

Briscoe provided the second and third in Carry Over and Maid of the Heath filly, and a nice surplus came to the owner of the runner-up when the winner was bought in for 600 guineas.

To-day's Prospects

Hyperion will be the attraction as an indivi-dual to-day, and as Felicitation is also a pro-bable runner it looks like being the St. Leger over again between the pair. Hyperion will be giving 6lb. on this occasion, but the differ-ence should not enable Felicitation to turn the tables, especially as the conditions will be exactly to the liking of the little Derby winner.
