IF Gordon Richards could have had his choice of Derby mounts before the Two Thousand Guineas there is no doubt what he would have chosen. Now that another—an altegether unexpected—"ride" looks like coming his way through Lord Woolavington's purchase of the French colt Easton, I wonder what he thinks of his chance of upsetting Colombo—the horse he would certainly have chosen had he been free to make a choice.

But remember it is by no means a foregone conclusion that Richards will ride Easton at Epsom. The champion is first jockey to the Beckhampton stable and even if Medieval Knight can be ruled out as a Derby possible after his bad failure in the Guineas, there is still Lo Zingaro—also the property of Mr. J. A. Dewar—to be considered.

His Best Chance

Still, whether it is Easton—who is said to have cost Lord Woolavington £15,000—or Lo Zingaro, Richards will have the best Derby mount that has come his way so far. The great race is unlikely to elude him for all time, and at the worst he will be on a horse that is only a length bchind the supposed best for many years. And should Lo Zingaro prove better than Easton his prospects must be brighter than ever.

Colombo, by the way, gave Newmarket another scare on Saturday. He was missing from exercise, and, of course, the town was immediately full of rumours as the reason. Nothing more than the need for physic was the cause of all the bother. Umidwar was also supposed to have met with a mishap, but although he was a little sore after his Guineas effort he was out at exercise as usual.
