By BOUVERIE O N Saturday morning it would have been possible to have obtained 50 to 1 against Medieval Knight for the Derby. Nothing like those odds will be offered when the card is called-over to-day after his spectacular victory in the Derby Trial Sweepstakes at Lingfield. Tiberius was beaten by only a short head at level weights, but it was a remarkable turn of speed at the end of a mile and a half that got the Knight first past the post. * * * On his Newbury form when he mede his first

On his Newbury form, when he made his first appearance this season. Medieval Knight was a good thing to beat Tiberius since the Manton horse was receiving 13lb. and was four lengths: behind. After that, however, Mr. Dewar's colt gave a very poor show in the Guineas, and his subsequent failure to beat Achtenan at a differ-ence of only 7lb. at Kempton suggested that he was definitely on the down grade.

Not Back Yet

Not Back Yet Still, although Medieval Knight showed on Saturday that his "slide" was not as bad at it first appeared, his performance cannot be said to have put him back on the pedestal from which he had fallen. A short head represents 11b, in handicapping, so either Medieval Knight has gone back or Tiberius has improved more than a stone since they first met. It is a pretty problem indeed, but the fact that a second-rater like On Top, receiving merely 71b, was only a length and a half behind the pair, does not suggest that the race showed us another April the Fifth.

The question now is, whether Lo Zingaro or Easton are considered much better than Medieval Knight. The question will no doubt have its answer in the one Richards rides on Wednesday week. What a pity Lingfield did not get some of the rain that "favoured" Man-chester, so that Lo Zingaro could have settled at least part of the problem.

Four for Epsom

Totar for Lpsom Instead of taking his part in the Lingfield race, Badruddin stayed at home to help Umid-war in one of the best gallops done so far at Newmarket. Alishah and Achtenan—who will complete Frank Butters's team of four for Epsom—were also in the gallop, and so was Young Lover, who is not unlikely to win the Yorkshire Cup this week. They went the full mile and a half, and after being kept in the rear for nearly a mile, Umidwar caught the others and finished very strongly.

Colombo was also sent the full Derby dis-tance, and found Red Horizon a poor sort of galloping companion. The "schoolmaster," ridden by Crickmere, was given three lengths start, but before they had gone very far Colombo had taken the lead and Red Horizon was a long way astern when the favourite pulled up. Colombo moved splendidly throughout the gal-lop, but a spin in such moderate company told nothing as to his real staying ability.

Myrobella ran in a handicap for the first time when she reappeared at Lingfield on Saturday. Naturally, she was called upon to concede a lot of weight, but her brilliant speed pulled her through after Spirituelle II had

ONE-HAND WIN FOR HARRY MIZLER

Light-weight Champion Outpoints Frenchman at the Ring

PLUCKY LOSER

Although he boxed for eight rounds with an injured right hand, Harry Mizler, of St. George's, the British light-weight champion, had no difficulty in defeating Tiger Defer, of France, on points in a ten rounds contest at the Ring, London, yesterday.

Mizler gave a great display of left-hand

punching, and won practically every round. Defer landed an occasional right-hand punch to the head, but never looked like extending

to the head, but never looked like extending the champion. He was a plucky loser and took considerable punishment. It was one of Mizler's best displays since he won the light-weight title, and considerably enhanced his stock, which had fallen in recent forbts fights.

fights. In other contests Johnny Rust (South Africa) outpointed Curley Merritt (Silvertown); Arthur Crane (Battersea) and Billy Curran (Walton) boxed a draw and Billy Nash (Clerkenwell) beat Harry Orton (Leicester), the referee in-tervening in the eleventh round.

NEW CHANCE FOR PHILLIPS

His Injured Knee Has Mended Satisfactorily and He Has a Busy Time Ahead

In view of the fact that Eddle Phillips may have another chance to win the cruiser-weight championship, his match with Theo Sass, of Belgium, at Wandsworth Greyhound Stadium on the night of Derby Day, June 6, assumes additional importance. Phillips has fully recovered from his injured knee and has been boxing with all his old dash and skill. He is most anxious to keep himself fit by fighting more often, and his contest with Sass will be the prelude to a more vigorous campaign in the ring. Phillips will need to be at his best to beat Sass, who is the ex-light-heavy-weight cham-pion of Europe, and, naturally, a man of con-siderable experience. He has fought heavy-weights with success and has had several contests in this country, in all of which he has done well.
