HAS RICHARDS PICKED THE RIGHT ONE? Medieval Knight Left to Steve Donoghue for the Derby EASTON'S PROGRESS The Aga Khan's Trio Still Setting a Big Problem

announced that Gordon Richards-who has never won a Derby-would ride Easton at Epsom on Wednesday, leaving Steve Donoghue, who has won the race four times-to ride Medieval Knight. Lo Zingaro is still "doubtful" unless rain falls heavily, and as that appears highly improbable it looks as if we can count on the absence of the best bred horse in the race.

The Beckhampton trainer did not add any particulars as to Saturday's gallop, which I have been able to gather was not nearly such a testing spin as has been anticipated. According to all accounts, Easton has shown such marked improvement during the last week or so that a severe test five days before the race was not necessary to determine Richards in his choice of mounts.

Easton Stays

When Easton first went to Beckhampton I When Easton first went to Beckhampton I believe there were doubts about his stamina. At least he was a bit of a puller, and such horses often fail to stay. Gradually, however, he settled down to his work, and it looks as if Richards will on Wednesday have the best chance that has come his way so far at Epsom. Easton is certainly the Wiltshire favourite, but, with a wholesome dread of Colombo, the ex-perts in a district from which so many Derby winners have come reckon him only "good each way." But has Richards picked the right one?

But whatever Wiltshire thinks about the re-spective merits of Easton and Medieval Knight there is no doubt what wil, be the most popu-lar each-way bet with the great British public, It is nine years since Donoghue won his last Derby, but his hands have not lost their cun-ning, as we have seen on so many occasions lately, and he has certainly lost none of the faith the man-and-woman in the street has always had in him as "the" jockey for Epsom. Epsom.

The Knight's Price

At the last call-over Medieval Knight's price was 33 to 1. The doubts about Lo Zingaro caused subsequently a drop to 28% in the offices, and now that it is known definitely that Donoghue will ride it will no doubt be clipped still further—probably to round about 20 to 1. Easton is also tolerably sure to be at less than his previous price of 10 to 1, but the general tightening up of the front rankers may not come until the final call-over to-morrow evening.

Any idea that Frank Butters would depart from his usual custom and formally try his three runners was knocked on the head when Umidwar parted company with Badruddin and Alishah again on Saturday to do another gallop with Felicitation. The chief hope of the stable again stuck well to the older horse, but there is still a feeling among many good judges at Newmarket that the race will come a bit too soon for him.

Colombo's Gallop

Bondsman caused a bit of a stir in the bet-ting last week, and as a result he has received more attention from the "men of observation" than would have otherwise been the case. Apparently they see in him a much-improved colt, but surely they are looking for a turf miracle if they are looking for him to beat Colombo, who on Saturday treated Buckland as he treats everything else he goes with at home.

Cheery Jack Sirett was also in the lime-light at Windsor when winning on Birth Certificate and Douglas for Sir Malcolm Mc-Alpine. Whereas Birth Certificate is trained by Victor Smyth at Epsom, Douglas is under the charge of Jim Bell. One had to lay guineas to pounds on Birth Certificate, but Douglas was at 100-6.

Smart Filly

Lieutenant-Colonel Giles Loder, who won the Derby fourteen years ago with Spion Kop, owns a very useful filly in Annabel. A daughter of the wonderful Arabella, she made all the run-ning in the Rose Hill Plate at Doncaster. She moved as if she was a little green, and it is plain the race will do her a iot of good. Caste, another youngster making his first appearance in public, swerved across the course after hav-ing covered about two furlongs and was pulled up. It was found that he had broken a fetlock, and he was destroyed.

Perryman, who rarely uses his whip, scored a double event on Bannlaw and June Rose. Necker spoiled his chance in Bannlaw's race by swerving badly, and June Rose won the Ross-ington Handicap through staying better than Nepcote and Hussar.
