Prospects of Another "Butters Week"

THOSE who fancy Mary Tudor 11 for the Cambridgeshire will be delighted to learn that the uncertainty regarding a lockey has been settled. Steve Donoghue has been released from riding Homily, and he will steer the French filly on Wednesday. Steve rode Mary Tudor 11, in a good gallop of a mile at Newmarket on Saturday, and she shaped quite well against the two horses that accompanied her.

Mary Tudor II went to the head of the betting immediately it was decided that she should take her chance, and the business done, apart from that recorded at the Club call-overs, has been most significant. It may be stretching a point to suggest that she is regarded as another Palais Royal II, but there is not a shadow of doubt that a lot of money will go to France if she wins.

As the heroine of the French One Thousand As the heroine of the French One Thousand Guineas, an unlucky loser in the Oaks at Chantilly, and a good winner since, Mary Tudor II is undoubtedly well treated on her best form. Buckland, who figures on the same mark, is a long way behind the classic form on this side, and English standard may not be very far in front of that on the other side

Class Counts

A top-class three-year-old is always to be feared in the Cambridgeshire. Happily we also can produce a few of that sort in Flamenco, Badruddin and Wychwood Abbot. Spend a Penny may also be included without an undue stretch of imagination, because she was thought right in the top flight at the beginning of the season, and 28lb, below top weight is a dangerous mark for an Ascot winner of any sort.

It never does to leave out Frank Butters these days, but I should not like to choose between Badruddin and Spend a Penny before the draw—and with equal luck in that respect I should have a decided preference for Flamenco. I have seen Lord Roseberr's colt referred to as "only a miler," but the book shows that he gave Windsor Lad a very good race over a furlong further than the distance of the Cambridgeshire early in the year.

Stable Problems

Like Butters, the Stockbridge trainer Easterbee has a stable problem. It concerns Caymanus and Grand Rounds, who have both been well in the limelight—in the betting sense—during the last few days. A home gallop, following a dead-heat in a very minor race at Newbury, is said to have shown Grand Rounds to great advantage. It may have done, but I cannot bring myself to regard her as likely to beat Caymanus on Wednesday.

Whether Badruddin and Spend a Penny succeed or fail in the big handicap it should be another great week for Frank Butters. Felicitation runs his last race in the Jockey Club Cup and it will be a staggering surprise if he does not score a farewell victory. Hairan, in the Dewhurst Stakes, may be only one of several two-year-old winners from the stable, and we may see Master Vere resume his successful sequence in the Limekin Stakes.

With a little luck Butters might have won the Newbury Handicap with Robber Chief on Saturday. Sir Alfred Butt's colt did not have
