PITY THE POOR MANAGER!

His Is the Most Precarious Job -Without Luck

There is none for whom I feel more sorry at the moment than Charlie Jones, who has resigned the position of manager of Notts County after little more than three months of experience in such a position.

He must have felt bitter disappointment and disillusion, for no man, on the threshold of a new career, lightly resigns his first position.

The managership of a big professional football club holds out some rich prizes, for the few, but I doubt if there is a more precarious profession.

Is there any other job of importance in which luck plays so big a part? To any man contemplating taking up the position of a football manager I would say, "Are you confident not merely of your qualifications but of your luck? Otherwise, seek something else."

On the whole, the position of manager has altered a good deal of recent years, and for the better, precarious though it still is. There have never been so many managers as at present who are managers in fact as well as in name.

I grant that there are those who will tell you that they have a free hand when that is not literally the truth, but it is a fact that quite a number of managers to-day justify the title.

"ALMOST A CLERK"

Twenty years ago I doubt if there was one. At least such was a rare bird indeed. The directors used to run the club with a certain amount of help from the alleged manager, who, actually, was little better than a clerk.

It is not so very long ago that I, knowing something, asked a director of a great First Division club just what was the position of the manager. How did they pick the team?

"That," I was told, "is picked by the whole of the directors. The manager is present and is appealed to when we think fit. But he has no vote in the choice of the team, and cannot speak unless he is invited to do so."

"Well," I said, "in my view, you should be relegated next season and be at the bottom of the Second Division the next. If you cannot trust your manager to do a great deal more than that, he is of no use. He is not worth the very indifferent salary I know you pay him."

You should sack him. If he be the right man, then for goodness sake let him manage."
