## 5 NEW RULE CASES AT LORD'S

### Yorkshire Rout M.C.C. —Sussex All Parks

The experimental "leg before wicket" rule came into full force at Lord's on Saturday, when five batsmen in all fell to it.

Yorkshire lost three of their first six wickets in this way, but gained a big advantage, as in reply to their 228, M.C.C. made only 84, and the County finished 144 ahead with all their wickets in hand.

Hardstaff and Beet, the umpires, both gave their decisions under the new rule clearly by holding up the open right hand after giving the batsman out. Fisher, a left-handed bat, was out to a googly from Robins.

Leyland was easily the most successful batsman of the day, and played in resolute style for two hours, hitting six 4's.

### WELLARD'S BIG HITS

Lieutenant K. A. Sellar, the old England Rugby full back, was responsible for a magnificent catch on the boundary when Wood tried for a 6 to square leg.

Another splendid catch went to the credit of Barling at the Oval, where Somerset kept Surrey in the field all day in scoring 313 for seven.

R. A. Ingle, the Somerset captain, got one full on the "meat" of the bat and Barling, at extra cover, caught left-handed a ball that was travelling at a tremendous pace.

Somerset's batting was one of contrasts. Earlier, the two Lees and Hawkins were painfully slow. Then came Wellard to smite the Surrey attack to all parts of the field. Four prodigious drives counted six apiece, and he also had half a dozen fours.

### BROTHERS SAVE SIDE

Wyatt scored his second century in successive innings at Edgbaston, where Gloucester did well to dismiss Warwick for 228.

After obtaining his first 50 out of 96 in just over an hour and a half, the Warwickshire captain slackened perceptibly. Always, however, his batting was the essence of soundness.

The rest of the batting was moderate, and Gloucester lost three batsmen, including Hammond, for 78.

The brothers Parks contributed 154 of Sussex's total of 288 against Glamorgan at Cardiff.

Sound and watchful in defence, both punctuated their play with bursts of rapid scoring. Glamorgan lost three wickets for 51 before the close.

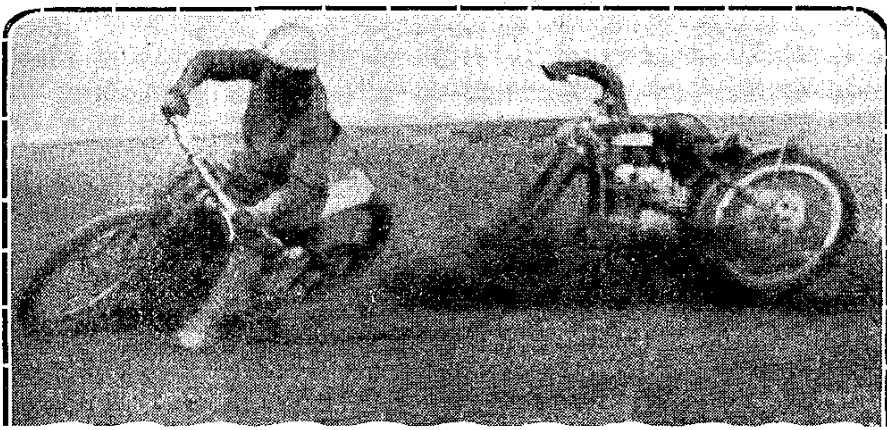

## Tourists Saved by Newcomers

### SIXTH WICKET STAND AFTER POOR START

By adding 127 for the sixth wicket E. A. Rowan and K. Viljoen, two newcomers to England, saved the South Africans from disaster at Leicester, where the tourists ran up a total of 312.

Siedle, confident from the start of the game, looked like getting a lot of runs, but having scored 38 out of 51 made for the opening stand he was beaten by an off break.

Wade, the captain, could not get going, and despite a neat and promising innings by Nourse, who revealed some beautiful strokes, the tourists had half their wickets down for 98 at lunch time.

### DEMPSTER'S FINE EXAMPLE

Then Rowan and Viljoen set themselves sternly to the task of recovery. Viljoen, a stylish batsman concentrated on stubborn defence, but Rowan, a graceful, punishing player, delighted the crowd by skilful hitting all round.

Rowan did not give any real chance during a stay of three hours twenty-five minutes, and he had half a dozen fours in his 91 out of 174.

C. S. Dempster, the New Zealander, who captained the county side, set an inspiring example to his men, whether fielding at silly mid-on or silly mid-off or cover.

Viljoen played capital cricket for nearly four hours, and his unassuming 93 out of 214 was faultless. He hit eleven fours.

Oldham played much better than their position in the table suggests. Their biggest fault was that the defence was liable to become flustered under pressure.

Swift, in goal, gave a masterly exhibition. Shots were showered upon him from all directions.

The Oldham forward line was a lively one, and, due largely to faulty defensive play by Barrett and company, was unlucky not to score.

Despite this, West Ham showed the more signs of "class."

The game was virtually won and lost ten minutes after the start, when Barrett crashed home a great drive from twenty-five yards range.

When the Hammers became confident of their own result, the play started to deteriorate. Mangnall scored another goal before half time and that settled the issue.

The most pleasing part of the West Ham side was the forward line.

Morton was the best, and when Mangnall was injured the outside right went to centre forward with great success.

## SPEEDWAY PROTESTS

Two protests arose at the Belle Vue speedway meeting when West Ham held Belle Vue, the league champions, to a draw at 35 points each.

Johnnie Hoskins, the West Ham manager, lodged the protests, the first against the disqualification of Arthur Atkinson in heat seven, for an alleged foul, and the second on the grounds of a too lengthy interval.
