

ENGLAND LOSING THE SECOND TEST

Woolley Again Just Misses the Century—Dropped Catches Add to Australia's Lead.

OPENING OF ROYAL ASCOT TO-DAY.

England, or, at least, some of her sons, did better at Lord's yesterday in the second day of the 101st Test match against Australia. But at the close we were only 88 on in the second innings with but two wickets to fall. There was some fine cricket during the day, and but for Gregory being missed in the slips when he had made eight and again at thirty-three—both times by Evans—there might have been a different story to tell. Most of the 243 we have got on the tins in the second knock might have been there for keeps, instead of serving to wipe off a deficit.

Woolley Unlucky.—Yesterday was again Woolley's day. He went to the wicket when D. J. Knight had failed for the second time, and he and Dipper added 93 runs for the second wicket, and they looked like scoring hundreds. But Dipper, after getting 40 splendidly, hit across a full toss from McDonald and had his off-stump knocked out. Woolley got into the nineties again, and then was caught at short leg by Hendry, a prince of fieldsmen, off a fine hit. Woolley had thumped a long hop from Mailey hard, and Hendry held it at the third attempt.

188 in the Match.—Woolley's knock was a brighter one than he had played in his first innings, and his 188 in the match is a grand record in a game in which our batting failed for the most part. Dipper's defence was excellent, and he hit the ball hard all the time instead of poking at it as so many did.

Tennyson Comes Off.—After Dipper left and Hendren had failed again, Douglas looked like staying in. Perhaps he was a trifle too cautious, but when Woolley was caught at 165 his captain went at the same total. Tennyson, after a shaky start, played really well, but Evans never flattered the hopes of the crowd. Parkin helped Tennyson to the extent of 33 and "Struddy" made a fine leg hit to the ropes off Armstrong in the last over of the day.

Two Wickets for One Run.—In his first over and before a run had been scored Douglas got Bardsley, Woolley making a neat catch at slip off his second ball. Armstrong came in and had his middle stump uprooted by Durston, and two wickets were down for one run. Things might have been even better, but Gregory was missed when 8 by Evans at second slip off Durston, and Taylor nicked one from Durston which missed his leg bail by a coat of varnish. Evans missed Gregory again when the Australian fast bowler had made 33—this time off Parkin—and he went on to collect 52 before returning one to the Lancashire man.

Carter's Bustling Innings.—Carter's knock at the close of the Australians' innings was a very bright effort indeed. He hit to leg and played the chop shot past point and down the gully very well indeed, and rattled up his runs quickly. Durston bowled better than his figures of 4 for 102 would suggest. Yesterday morning he sent them down at a fine pace, and kept a good length. Parkin, too, was not flattered by his figures. Only rain can now save England from a second defeat, and he would be a poor sportsman who prayed for it.

COUNTY GAMES.

Big Task for Sussex.—Sussex have a big task with Kent, as the top county with a wicket in hand lead by no fewer than 422. V. W. C. Jupp carried his score to 139, and for Kent Hardinge hit up 119 in three hours and a half, while A. E. Day was unbeaten at the close of play with 180 to his credit. Day was also in form with the ball, having captured three wickets for 40. Up to the present twenty-nine wickets have fallen for 950 runs.

Bestwick's Bowling.—Bestwick has been in great form at Bath. In the first innings of Somerset he took eight wickets for 84 runs, and in the second five for 66, his total "bag" being thirteen for 150. Grainger, a slow left-hander, of Dinington Colliery, also did well in taking four for 91. Derbyshire require 239 to win, and half the side have been disposed of for 70. Grainger returns to his own club after Derbyshire have completed their Western tour.

Women Golfers in France.—The French Women's Open Golf Championship opens at Fontainebleau to-day. A medal competition played over the course yesterday resulted in Miss Alexa Stirling, the American champion, winning with a round of 76. Miss Phyllis Lobbet and Miss Molly Griffiths returned 82. England will be well represented in the championship. Miss Molly Griffiths will meet Miss Audrey Croft in the second round to-morrow, both having drawn byes in the first round. Miss Christina Clark (present girl champion), Mrs. R. V. Finlay and Miss Joyce Wethered are others who have drawn byes in the first round. Miss Cecil Leitch meets Miss Alice Nanchett (San Francisco) to-day.

Golf Champions Preparing.—Many intending competitors for the open golf championship were practising at St. Andrews yesterday. With E.

French, the American, as partner, Abe Mitchell beat George Duncan and T. Kerrigan, America, by one hole. J. H. Kirkwood, Australia, and W. Reid, America, defeated Jock Hutchison and J. McLeod by one hole. Later Kirkwood and Reid defeated Hazen and McLeod by two and 1. Kirkwood going round in 70. Mitchell and Reid squared their match with Hutchison and Barnes.

"Lawner" at Queen's.—An entry of 92 was secured for the men's London championship, which opened at Queen's Club yesterday. An interesting match in the preliminaries was that in which Z. Shimidzu (Japan) beat N. E. Dass (India) by 6-0, 6-1. In the second round the Jap defeated E. Helmore by 6-1, 6-0.

Roman Bachelor and Leighton.—Leighton has been sent for the Trial Stakes, and unless the hard ground keeps him away, as it did at Newbury, it should be a great race between the Derby failure

and Roman Bachelor. There is no doubt that Leighton is a good horse over a mile, but so is Roman Bachelor, and on the weight-for-age scale he appears to have a little in hand.

Stables to Follow.—Reecho, also from Gilpin's stable, is expected to follow up his Epsom victory in the Coventry Stakes, even with Pondoland, who won so easily at Newbury, among the opposition. Gilpin, like Alec Taylor, is tolerably sure to win several races during the week, and both stables should be good to follow over the four days. Chat Tor will be the one to attempt to win the Ascot Stakes to-day for Manton, and I think he will succeed, although I know both Thealy and Santavon are well fancied.

Glanmerin Favourite.—Glanmerin was a better favourite than Lacrosse when the card on the Hunt Cup was called over yesterday afternoon, and there is no mistaking the confidence that he will go one better than last year. Square Measure, his conqueror on that occasion, is very unlikely to run owing to the hard state of the ground, and unless required for Cornsack—a very remote contingency, I understand—Donoghue, as at Manchester, will ride Lord Londonderry's colt.

Fancy Man Doubtful.—The report that Fancy Man may not be started will come as no surprise after the backing of his stable companion, Beauregard. Three-year-olds, however, have a very poor record in this race, and Beauregard only claims distinction in that he has surprised his owner by two weak displays this season when very much "expected." Lacrosse and Valescure both keep places in the forefront of the betting, but the market is still very sensitive, and there may be an upheaval to-day.

Gold Cup Candidates.—Tangiers, who won the Gold Cup last year, and the disqualification of Barchin, has failed a victim to hurgers, and we hear that it is doubtful if we shall again see Sir William Nelson's horse on a racecourse. Still, with Pericostum—who leaves to-day's Gold Vase to his stable companion Copyright—Happy Man, Silvern and Comrade in the field, the race will uphold its best traditions.

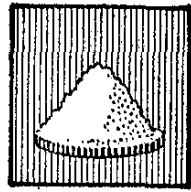
