"Real Yorkshire Roar."—Lord Londonderry added the Portland Handicap to his St Leger victory yesterday, and for the first time at the meeting we heard the real "Yorkshire roar." Required for Star Grass, Donoghue had to give up the mount on the winner to Carslake, and Jelliss wore Mr. J. White's colours on Pharmacie. The changes had the effect of sending the Foxhill filly out slightly in the market, but made no difference in the case of Glanmerin, who remained a firm favourite throughout. He justified his backers' confidence by making light of the "crusher" of 9st. 5lb.

How Glanmerin Won.—Orby's Pride showed his usual fine speed at the beginning, and Valescure got away rather better than the favourite. Carstake, however, was never far behind the leaders, and, with rather less than half-way to go, had passed Valescure while Orby's Pride, on the stand side, had given way to Vencedor. From then to the end it was all plain sailing for Lord Londonderry's horse, who lengthened his lead the further they went, and ultimately won easily by three lengths. Vencedor and Pharmacie were well up behind Sunblaze; indeed, all three appeared to finish in front of Nabob, who was at first placed third.

One to Leave A'one.—Most Beautiful deserves another name after her latest failure in the Alexandra Handicap. At no period in the race did she appear likely to be near the front, and it seems that she has neither course nor distance. Northern Light, on the other hand, was always there or thereabouts, and beat everything except Yutoi, who came through in great style at the distance and won very easily by four lengths. Yokel ran well under his big weight, considering that it was his eleventh race this season.

Spear's Lucky Double,—Doagh colt had his full share of luck in winning the Jubilee Plate, and his stable companion, the Combination colt, had even more in beating Captain Cuttle in the Rons Plate. A big, upstanding son of Hurry On, Captain Cuttle seemed totally oblivious of what was required of him until Combination colt had the race won. Then he came through like a steam engine, and was going

nearly twice as fast as the winner at the finish. It may be worth remembering that there was a lot of money for Lady Juror, but more important still not to forget that Captain Cuttle is going to be a great

In the Sa'e Ring.—Lord Glanely has evidently tired of the sons and daughters of Blue Tit. Two years ago he gave 11.500 guineas for Westward Ho: last year he eclipsed the record by going to 14.500 guineas for Blue Ensign. When a half-sister to the pair came under the hammer yesterday there was quite a buzz of excitement, but it soon died down, as Lord Glanely retired at 7.600 guineas. The Hon. G. Lambton secured the filly for another hundred.

Whittaker, yesterday, in recognition of his services to the Scarborough cricket festival.
