**Winding-Up Gallops.**—Harrier completed his preparation with a nice gallop with Plantagenet yesterday morning, and Devizes, Front Line and Tishy were others that gave every satisfaction in their final spins. I did not come across Money Glass, but I am assured that he has never been better and is one of the few that has proved his stamina this season. Still, I have always regarded Harrier as the best handicapped horse in the race, and the assistance of Donoghue in a gallop of this description is a splendid asset.

**How Orpheus Won.**—Paragon, looking all the better for his Kempton race, turned out in the Champion Stakes yesterday in an attempt to rival the "double" Orpheus brought off twelve months ago. Meeting the same Orpheus, however, on 7lb. worse terms than they were originally handicapped in the Cambridgeshire, he also met more than his match. Sir H. Curllife Owen's colt took the lead when Gray chose, and won on a tight rein from Redhead. The latter was doing all her best work at the finish. Love in Idleness was never dangerous at any point.

**Trainers' Troubles.**—Apart from the Ditch Mile Nursery and the Visitors' Handicap, the other racing was poor in the extreme. Coughing and hard ground, of course, were the cause, and, as one trainer put it, we shall not know where we stand for the rest of the season. Wittol won the Nursery for Lord Rosebery and won it all the way. Charley's Aunt, expected to add to Captain Hogg's successes in the race, was a sufferer at the start, and the well-handicapped Cato dropped out after six furlongs.

**Corporal Strikes Winning Form.**—Corporal, the "record-priced selling player," won his first race for Mr. Horning when he ran away with the Visitors' Handicap. Chivalrous, backed like a good thing, was tired off, and another failure was Broken Faith, who found the weight a lot too much. Mr. McColl was quietly hopeful about Pomar's chance, and that colt justified him by beating all save the winner. The second should be placed to win, and this latest display emphasises how unlucky he has been in his previous races.

**Cambridgeshire Favourites Scratched.**—The scratching of Soranus, announced yesterday, will cause lamentation for the horse had been favourite for the Cambridgeshire practically all through. All the same, backers must have known that, with training grounds as they are, they were taking an undue risk with a horse known to be not too sound.

In the women's singles Miss Holman and Mrs. Edington secured comfortable victories, but Mrs. O'Neill only beat Mrs. Jackson after three good sets.

**Athletics at Cambridge.**—The majority of the members of last year's splendid Cambridge athletic team will be in residence again, and a very successful season's work at Fenner's is anticipated. W. E. Seagrove (Clare) has been elected president, and H. M. Abrahams (Caius) honorary secretary. Other prominent athletes who will be available include E. D. Mounsey (Trinity), H. H. Stallard (Caius), Guy M. Butler (Trinity), H. H. Stallard (Caius), who put up such a wonderful performance in the mile championship this year, together with W. T. Marsh, W. G. Tatham, D. P. The inter-varsity relay races are to be decided this term, probably at Oxford, but the date is not yet fixed.

A few weeks ago Mountain was credited with creating a new record time for 500 metres at Stockholm. Then he did 1m. 53-5/8, 2s. better than E. Race's record made in 1913.

**For Gold Medals.**—Clapton Orient will take their London Professional Charity Fund match with Crystal Palace at Selhurst to-day very seriously. Anyway, they will play a full League side, although it is just possible that Smith will be at outside right again after missing a couple of matches. Should this be decided upon, Bratby will be omitted and Gillatt will "carry on" at inside right. The match is likely to provide some inkling of what will happen when the sides meet for League points next month.

**Football Suspensions.**—Several players who were sent off the field in F.A. Cup-ties were dealt with yesterday. J. Tilley (Woking) and J. Hodson

(Guildford United) were suspended for a month, J. Woods (Ton Pentre) for four weeks, R. Foreman (Worthing) for fourteen days and C. H. Orford (Gnome Athletic) for seven days. The draw was also made for the second qualifying round of the F.A. Cup, the ties to be played on October 23.

**Lord Lifford and Northants.**—The disputes among the members of the Northants Cricket Club threatens to wreck the club. The malcontents desire to remove the three honorary secretaries and appoint one at £400 a year, and also propose drastic reductions in the number of professionals. Lord Lifford, the president, whose generosity has many times got the club out of difficulties, has stated his connections with the club will cease if the present secretaries are removed. And as the feeling against the old regime is very strong the position is not too hopeful.

### BASHAM CONFIDENT.

**No Worry About Weight.**—"The life and soul of Wrexham," is how Johnny Basham was described to me yesterday when I visited the North Wales town to see how he worked for his fight with Kid Lewis, which takes place at the Albert Hall on Friday. He had to train so rigorously to meet Lewis at the welter-weight limit for the last fight and found such difficulty in keeping his weight down to ten and a half stone that on the morning of the match he had to do sixteen miles on the road before he could weigh in. Now, with no worry as to weight, he is happy and confident.

**Old Punch Back.**—Basham told me he is sure he has got that old electric punch back which won him so many fights in his early welter-weight days. Wales will not hear of his defeat, and George Cook, who meets Carpenter in Major Wilson's next big promotion, says Johnny's punch is good enough for any middle-weight. They are fast pals, and Cook has assisted in Basham's training for this contest. Basham has been able to cut out all road work and has been able to concentrate on gymnasium and sparring practice.

**Teaching the Boys.**—Johnny says he is as strong as ever he was, and we know he can box. He is 10st. 11lb. now and will weigh in on Friday at about that figure. Yesterday, in the Royal Welch Fusiliers gymnasium, Basham boxed three rounds with seven boxers, varying from Boy McCann to George Fernon, a heavy-weight. Come on, Tarzan," said Basham, when Vernon came into the ring. With the boys he seemed to be teaching all the time and telling them what to do and how to hit him. He chinned Vernon and put him down.
