Fine Gymnast.—Gilligan has played football, under both codes, is a fine gymnast and is a handicap nine man at golf. Gilligan has played outside-right at hockey for both Wimble-don and Sussex. One of his best cricket per-formances was against his county whilst he was up at Cambridge. On the Sussex ground at Hove in 1919 he and J. H. Naumann made 177 for the last wicket, Gilligan's share being 101.
