TO-DAY'S GOSSIP ON ALL SPORTS.

Will Mills Win the Marathon for the Third Successive Year ?-Beckett v. Carpentier. **KENNETH CAMPBELL SENSATION.**

To-day's Sports Meetings .- Although chief interest to athletes not engaged in races themselves will centre on the Stamford Bridge meeting, there are other events that should receive attention. Queen's Club is the venue of the inter-hospital championship sports, and spectators who go to this ground will have not only the satisfaction of seeing some fine racing, but also the knowledge that they will be helping the hospitals of London during a very lean period. A comprehensive programme has been made out for the Pearl A.C. gathering at Norbiton, and the meeting will be more or less open to other City sportsmen. Other meetings are:-Swindon sports, L. and N.-W. Railway A.A. sports (Wembley), Midland Railway sports (Cricklewood) and Kentish Wheelers (fifty miles N.C.U. championship), Herne Hill.

Sport Boom in Leeds.—The annual report and balance-sheet of the Leeds Cricket, Football and Athletic Co., Ltd., shows a profit on the year of £1,976. Pleasure is expressed by the directors that the Board of Cricket Control con-sidered the arrangements for the cricket Test match as entirely satisfactory. The ground took the record receipts of £3,891 for a Northern Union match in England on the occasion of the football Test match, and also the record atten-dance of 34,827 on the occasion of the Cup final.

To-day's Big Marathon.—Although the roads are hard and dry, the competitors for to-day's Marathon race from Windsor to Stamford Bridge have been taking their final spins along the route. won the trophy for the previous two years, will want to be in his best form to gain a third vic-tory. Indeed, everything promises a close and exciting race and the time record will probably be improved.


