# COUNTY BATSMEN HAVE A GOOD TIME

Shepherd Defies Yorkshire Bowlers—Fender Hits of the famous lights which have been used for nearly all the big bouts in this country for a long time. And they will appear in no other daily picture paper.

## JOE FOX ACCEPTS BIG PARIS OFFER.

Although no huge scores were made in the eight county cricket matches started on Saturday batsmen generally had the best of matters. It was a day in which thrills were few and far between; indeed, in some of the matches the play, especially in the early stages, was extremely dull. Only three centuries were scored, Hendren (Middlesex), Kent (Leicester) and R. Tyldesley (Lancashire) being the successful batsmen. \* \* \*

Shepherd in Form.—The meeting of Yorkshire and Surrey at Bradford was particularly interesting, as these two counties head the championship table. The Londoners batted first, and Hobbs treated the crowd to a characteristic display. Shepherd took the batting honours of the day, however, with a brilliant 95, though it must be said he was rather favoured by luck in the early stages of his innings. Still, he played very soundly and defied the Yorkshire bowling for nearly four hours, a couple of 6's being his biggest hits.

Fender's Fireworks.—The most exciting batting of the day, however, came from Fender, who took 53 off the home bowlers in the forty minutes he was at the wickets. He hit seven 4's. Macaulay bowled effectively in the later stages of Surrey's innings, and the last four wickets went down quickty. Yorkshire went to the wickets for five minutes before stumps were drawn, but did not score a run.

### CHAMPIONS SLOW.

Middlesex' Dull Start.—The early Middlesex batting at Lord's was very unenterprising, and when the tea interval arrived only 172 runs had been scored. The Somerset bowlers kept a good length and the fielding was exceptionally keen. White bowled his left-handed slows and kept the batsmen on the defensive. Dales took two hours and 20 minutes for his 42. Play livened up somewhat when Hendren and Crutchley were associated, all loose balls being severely punished. severely punished.

Hendren Hits Out.—A change came over the batting after tea. Hendren was naturally careful just before reaching his 100, but afterwards he and Crutchley both took risks and remained masters of the situation to the drawing of stumps. Hendren has at present scored 120, and Crutchley is only eight short of three figures. The Somerset fielders worked smartly to the end of the day. figures. The Somerouto to the end of the day.

Russell Again.—Russell, of Essex, was again in form and he treated the Kent bowling with scant respect at Tonbridge. He timed his drives perfectly and took only an hour to reach his half century. He had scored 86 out of 143 in just under two hours when he was dismissed. The Kent bowling was very good and the subsequent Essex hatsmen could do little with it. Douglas contributed 35, but the immings closed for 212.

Fine Kent Batting.—Kent batsmen were soon masters of the Essex attack upon going to the wickets, although Hardinge did not stay long. With A. F. Bickmore and Seymour together runs came quickly, the amateur driving in confident style on the off-side of the wicket with great power. Whitcombe, a left-handed medium paced bowler, was punished rather severely by Seymour. Neither man gave a chance and the total just equalled the Essex score when stumps were drawn.

## NOTTS FIELD ALL DAY.

R. Tyldesley's First Century.—Excellent bowling by Notts rather subdued the Lancashire batsmen in the early stages of their innings at Old Trafford, but later in the day, when R. Tyldesley and Parkin were together, play grew very lively. The latter amused the spectators by scoring 52 out of 89 in 50 minutes. This is Parkin's third successive innings of 50 or over. R. Tyldesley had one or two "lives," but succeeded in putting together his first 100 in county cricket after a stay of two hours and 20 minutes. Lancashire remained at the wickets till the end of the day, the venture closing for 396.

Northants as Usual.—Once again Northants gave a feeble display of batting, their first innings at Brighton realising only 111. Roberts, who bowled very fast and appeared to get considerable spin on the ball, did most of the damage, taking half the wickets. Sussex did not fare particularly well when they went in, but they had no difficulty in passing the visitors' total. A. E. Gilligan and Higgs were responsible for the brightest batting of the day.

Leicester Bat All Day.—Rain interfered slightly with the Hampshire and Leicester match at Southampton. The visitors batted all day, and, as the score of 257 for four wickets would suggest, were very cautious. King played steadily in scoring his century, but he was fortunate in being missed when he was 6. Lord's 51 contained eight 4's, and Coe, who partnered King later in the innings, cut splendidly. Considering the lack of variety in the bowling, the scoring was remarkably slow, none of the batsmen showing any real enterprise.



Worcester's innings was interrupted by a shower, and they lost four men for 92 runs before play ceased for the day. for the day.
