

HOW KID LEWIS OUT-FOUGHT BURNS

Young Australian Beaten by Experience, Ringcraft and Hitting Powers—Lawn Tennis' Great Man. LEANDER AND HENLEY REGATTA.

Kid Lewis was too clever for Frankie Burns at Holland Park rink. He won the British Empire middle-weight championship in the eleventh round with a tremendous right to the jaw, which lifted Burns off his feet and knocked him right across the ring. He lay like a log and was counted out, and carried to his corner still asleep.

Much Clinching.—It was not a pretty bout, although there was a lot of clever work in it. Burns' defence was clever, but Lewis' punching in the clinches was cleverer, although he tucked his left hand away and held on to Burns' back persistently. Still, in the close work Burns was as a novice to Lewis, who frequently even looped the loop to the side of the Australian's head.

Burns' Defence Weakens.—It was a long time before Lewis landed anything approaching a damaging blow, but the persistence of his attack wore the other fellow down. First Burns' footwork—which was exceedingly good in the early rounds—went groggy, and then his defence in the clinches went weak, and finally in the closing rounds he was nearly as big a sinner in the matter of holding as Lewis himself. In his case it was defence, in Lewis' it was his method of attack.

Lewis' Anxious Moments.—Master Lewis himself had some anxious moments. In the sixth round Burns drove a hard left to Lewis' ribs which evidently shook him up, and he slung one or two wild blows in response, before Burns got a left and a right to the jaw. It worried Lewis, and the seventh round was a prolonged tussle. It was the worst round of the bout, but Lewis' ringcraft was coming into play, and he was fresh enough again for the eighth.

Dominated the Fight.—Burns had to fight as Lewis wanted him to, and when he went down to a left hook in the ninth round the end was in sight. Lewis tried to manoeuvre for an opening to end the bout in the tenth, but it did not come off, Burns' defence still being good. In the eleventh, after Burns had twice landed lightly with the left, he was caught coming into the

right hand, and with a terrific punch—the only really big one in the bout—Lewis finished it off, and most people were pleased, for by that time it was a foregone conclusion. P. J. MOSS.

LOWE STILL A POWER.

Great Lawn Tennis Player.—Although fast approaching the veteran stage (he was born in June, 1884), Gordon Lowe is still a power to be reckoned with in lawn tennis, as he is proving in Davis Cup matches this week. An old Carthusian and Clare College, Cambridge, man, Lowe was one of the earliest to join up during the war. He attained the rank of captain and was mentioned in dispatches.

Notable Victories.—Lowe has been described as essentially a base line player, but he possesses more versatility than the description would suggest. He represented Cambridge against Oxford as long ago as 1906, but did not reach the height of his powers until 1912, when he was first selected to represent the British Isles. His most notable successes include the covered courts and the London covered courts, the Australasian and the European covered courts championships. Lowe has won a large number of tournaments on the Riviera.

Dolphin's Benefit.—Kent will visit Leeds on Saturday to meet Yorkshire, and the match is set aside for the benefit of Arthur Dolphin, the Yorkshire stumper. "Dolly," as he is known to his intimates, was born at Wilsden, a few miles from Bradford, in 1885, and made his first appearance for Yorkshire when eighteen years of age, but two years earlier he had secured a professional appointment with the Clayton Club in the Bradford League. At sixteen he was a wonderfully smart stumper, and he has since proved himself to be one of the cleverest the game has produced.

HENLEY PROSPECTS.

Entries on Saturday.—Henley Regatta entries close next Friday and will be made public on Saturday afternoon. It is extremely probable that they will beat record so far as numbers go, although there are indications that the

Stewards' Cup and Visitors' Cup will not be particularly well supported.

Oxford Difficulties.—Last year Magdalen College, Oxford, won the Grand Cup, the principal event at the meeting, but at the forthcoming regatta Oxford University will not have a representative in. Magdalen decided not to row after the moderate showing of their crew during "Eights" Week, and New College have found difficulty in keeping their men together. As several of them will be rowing in Leander colours, it is likely that the old cry regarding the poaching proclivities of the latter will be revived. It does seem rather a pity that first-class oarsmen should so frequently be taken from their college crews in order to compete at one regatta a year.

To Repel the Foreigner.—Sight must not be lost of the fact, however, that there will be strong foreign competition for the Grand this year, and it behoves our authorities to meet it with the strongest possible eight. Cambridge, unlike Oxford, will have three crews—the first boats on the river at Cambridge—in the Grand. Indeed, the "Varsity" will be well represented in most events, and it appears pretty safe to predict for them a real good time.

The Diamonds.—There are more unlikely things than the Diamond Sculls being won by S. Earl, the three times winner of the Oxford U.B.C. Sculls, who will be making his first appearance in open competition. H. A. Belyear, the Canadian, withdrew after being beaten by W. M. Hoover, the American, at Philadelphia. Hoover, who has been out at Putney several times during the week, is about twenty-seven years of age and rows at about 11st. I fancy he will prove the pick of the foreigners. A. C. B.

Internationals Opposed.—In a Lancashire League cricket tournament to be played to-day between Church and Nelson, two famous fast bowlers, Sydney Barnes (Church) and E. A. McDonald (Nelson), will figure on opposing sides. McDonald has found the English climate trying and has had to spend a long spell at the travelling backwards and forwards for the Saturday matches.
