Kid Lewis was too clever for Frankie Burns right hand, and with a terrific punch-the only at Holland Park Rink. He won the British Empire middle-weight championship in the eleventh round with a tremendous right to the jaw, which lifted Burns off his feet and knocked him right across the ring. Burns' Defence Weakens .-- It was a long time before. Lewis landed anything approaching a damaging blow, but the persistence of his attack were the other fellow down. First Burns' footwork—which was exceedingly good in the early rounds—went groggy, and then his defence in the elinches went weak, and finally in the closing rounds he was nearly as big a sinner in the matter of holding as Lewis himself. Lewis' Anxious Moments. Master Lewis him-self had some anxious moments. In the sixth round Burns drove a hard left to Lewis' ribs which evidentity shook nim up, and he slung one or two wild blows in response, before Burns got a left and a right to the jaw. It worried Lewis, and the seventh round was a prolonged cuddle. It was the worst round of the bout, but Lewis' ringeraft was coming into play, and he was fresh enough again for the eighth.

Lewis tried to manœuvre for an opening to end the bont in the tenth, but it did not come off, Burns' defence still being good.
