TISHY—AT LAST.

Tamar and His Rivals for To-day's Eclipse Stakes at Sandown.

The old saying that everything comes to him who waits again had its justification at New-market yesterday. Tishy at last "came up" in the Summer Handicap-to the discomfiture of her scoffers, who regarded her as more a subject of humour than anything else.

In different circumstances, patience is likely to be rewarded at Sandown Park to-day, when Tamar is expected to gain his first victory by continuing Lord Aster's sequence of successes in the Eclipse Stakes.

Taylor has a wonderful record in Sandown's rich prize. Buchan won it three years ago after finishing second in the Derby. A year later the

In the circumstances I regard Prestongrange as the big danger to Tamar, since we know he is on the up grade, and he has also won over the course. Dry Toast is also fancied "cach way," and it will not surprise me if Tamar, Prestongrange and Carslake's mount are the three placed horses.

The King and Queen are expected to be present, and it will be a great day if Joss House carries the royal colours successfully in the Surbiton Stakes. Donoghue is to ride, and such a quick beginner will want a lot of catching on this course. Pretty Dick is the danger.

Tishy's victory over the hitherto all-conquering Double Hackle was not the only surprise at Newmarket yesterday. Legality upset the odds laid on Pharos in the Chesterfield Stakes, and Major Bealty's hopes—shared by a majority of visitors—of a double with His Excellency and Hale Shaw were shattered by a couple of rank ontsiders.

LEGALITY'S SUCCESS.

There was no excuse for Pharos. First off in a small field, he was in front until close home, when Legality came with one run and beat him comfortably by half a length. It was a splendid tribute to the merit of Town Guard, who had beaten the winner easily at Ascot.

IS GOLF TOO DEAR?

Holiday Players Leaving Their Clubs at Home.

GREEN FEE BOGEY.

We may envy the giant strides which golf is making in America—Inncy 325 players competing for the championship—but the game is steadily making headway in this country. At a rough estimate the number of British golfers probably exceeds half a million. There is little doubt, too, that there would be many more recruits if the game were not so expensive.

be many more recruits if the game were not so expensive.

It is true that golf within cortain limits is as dear as you care to make it. It you carry your own clubs, for instance, the expenses for the day may be reduced a half. It is not idleness, however, which leads to a golfer employing a caddio. He likes to be relieved of the burden and to have someone to follow the flight of the ball and to mark it as it scuttles into the bothersome long grass.

Moreover, a caddie, and especially one of those who appear to be endowed with the extra sense that takes them to a ball that the player would despair of retrieving, can easily save his day's pay with the price of each three shillings.

Still, a caddie is something of a luxury to-day.

HIGH SUBSCRIPTIONS.

Club subscriptions continue high, and there is no likelihood of any reduction at the present time, nor can there be until the cost of the upkeep of courses comes down. Even those clubs whose membership is full have no financial margin, and in many cases it is a struggle to make both ends meet.

There is, however, one charge which might be reduced and probably will. I refer to green fees, and particularly those at the seaside holiday courses. They were put up during the boom period after the war and money rolled in as it had never done before. But few have as much money as they would like to spend on golf to-day, and the fact is represented by the reduction in the number of visitors.

I have heard many complaints, and men who are going away with their families are not going to take their clubs with them. Very frankly they say: "I can't afford to play this year. I shall have to be content with spending the time with the kiddies on the beach."
