British Isles have scratched to Spain in the Davis Cup-tie. This amazing announcement caused a great sensation in the lawn tennis world yesterday. The L.T.A. announced that they were unable to secure a representative team to go to America, and have accordingly given a walk-over to Spain. The latter had intimated their intention of proceeding to America if successful in their tie against the British Isles.

Why We Scratched.—The reason prompting the L.T.A.'s action is that Major A. R. F. Kingscote and Randolph Lycett, the only two British Isles representatives who would have had any real chance of taking us into the challenge round against the holders, the United States, are unable, for business reasons, to make the journey.

Fairness to Spain.—Though the British Isles would have had an excellent, chance against Spain, it is felt that it would have not been fair to play without any intention of going further in the contest. Spain will, therefore, meet the winner of the tie between France and Australasia, which will take place in the United States.
