

BRITISH ISLES OUT OF THE DAVIS CUP

Lawn Tennis Association Give Spain a Walk-over—Kingscote and Lycett Cannot Visit America. FOX TRAINING FOR O'DONNELL.

British Isles have scratched to Spain in the Davis Cup tie. This amazing announcement caused a great sensation in the lawn tennis world yesterday.

Why We Scratched.—The reason prompting the L.T.A.'s action is that Major A. R. F. Kingscote and Randolph Lycett, the only two British Isles representatives who would have had any real chance of taking us into the challenge round against the holders, the United States, are unable, for business reasons, to make the journey.

Fairness to Spain.—Though the British Isles would have had an excellent chance against Spain, it is felt that it would have not been fair to play without any intention of going further in the contest.

Funding to 88 1/2 and Victory to 90 1/4. White Consols closed firm at 59. India stocks were strong. Home rails went ahead again, with North Easterns strong at 120 1/2 on fusion prospects. French rails remained dull. In Industrials, textiles were again prominent, Amal Cotton advancing to 168, and English Sewing Cotton to 45s 6d. Courtaulds came back to 51s. Railways were good all round; Government Areas 51, and De Beers 11 1/2. Chartered rose to 14s. 7 1/2. Oil shares were quiet.
