Showers again spoilt the complete enjoyment of Saturday's sport. Cricket was interrupted at most of the county grounds, and visitors to Hurst Park received an unexpected drenching towards the end of the afternoon. The chief features of the day's sport were:-

Racing.—La Lumiere won the Hurst Park T.Y.O. Plate very easily and her stable com-panion Corcyrian was successful in the Duchess of York Stakes.

Cricket.—Surrey are again in trouble at Black-heath, where Kent made 213 for the loss of eight wickets. Against Glamorgan, Cook, of Lancashire, took five wickets for 13 runs.

Swimming.—E. P. Peter won the Long Distance Swimming Championship from Kew to Putney and his club—Penguin S.C.—provided three men in the first four positions.

#### STEWARDS' CUP FANCIES.

#### Weathervane Backed for To-morrow's Big Sprint-Hurst Park Features.

As a prelude to Glorious Goodwood, Hurst Park was rather a success from the point of view of the bookmakers on Saturday. Bell's Life cut a very poor figure in the big two-year-old race, and although one or two of the winners were fairly well backed not one actual favourite was successful.

The King and Queen leave town to-day for Goodwood House, where they will be the guests of the Duke of Richmond and Gordon for the meeting. As usual, the royal colours will be carried on several occasions during the week, and Weathervane's previous running suggests that he has much more than an outside chance in the Stewards' Cup to-morrow.

Weathervane ran a fine race against Black Gown at the last Newmarket meeting, and the fast course will suit him admirably. I hear that R. Stokes, who is riding in such good form at present, will probably be his jockey. The colt was backed on Saturday at 100 to 6.

Lady Juror, Pharmacie and Tetrameter have, so far, been chiefly concerned in the betting, which will no doubt be more informing after the card has been called over this afternoon. Rumours that Lady Juror represents Tetrabbazia at 8st, 11b. must be taken with a grain of salt. And in spile of Lady Juror's position in the betting, it is by no means certain that she is the best Manton can provide.

#### CAPTAIN BEATTY'S CANDIDATES.

Another trainer causing quite a lot of deep thought is Captain Beatty, who is responsible for a quartette, inclue ang last year's winner, Service Kit, the top-weight, Black Gown, and the three-year-olds, His Excellency and Hale Shaw. After Saturday's performance at Hurst Park—where he was well beaten by Orderly and Western Hill—it sems safe to leave Hale Shaw out of consideration. On the Ascot form Black Gown cannot beat Proconsul, who would be a nice substitute for Pharmacie.

His Excellency and Service Kit were almost equally well backed in Saturday's call-over, and it is significant that there was quite a lot of money for Blackland. This colt, I believe, is fancied very much by Billy Higgs, his ex-jockey owner.

Captain Cuttle makes his reappearance at the meeting either in the Sussex Stakes on Wednesday or the Gordon Stakes later in the week. Tamar, according to present arrangements, goes for the Gratwicke Stakes to-morrow, and, with little to beat, Lord Astor's horse should at last get his head in front.

Easily the outstanding feature of Saturday's racing was the easy victory of La Lumicre in the Hurst Park T.Y.O. Plate. Beaten a long way by Town Guard and Cos seven days earlier, the filly simply squandered a useful field in which Bell's Life was a negligible quantity throughout throughout.

Vulpina colt, making his first appearance, was much better backed than the Stockbridge filly. Like Bell's Life, however, he was taken off his feet by the pace set by the winner and never looked like being even dangerous.

La Lumiere's victory completed a very nice double for Stockbridge, as Coreyrian had just previously taken the Duchess of York Stakes after a desperate sot-to with the luckless Brinklow. G. Smith was the jockey on each occasion. Hale Shaw, Cylvida, Well Beloved and one or two others, including Our William, were well backed in the Earlsfield Welter and the

## IN FLAMES AT 100 M.P.H.

#### Exciting Scene at Brooklands-George Duller's First Motor Victory.

A new German car provided most of the excitement at the annual meeting of the Essex Motor Club at Brooklands on Saturday.

While being driven by H. Barlow at well over 100 miles an hour the bonnet suddenly burst into flames, and in a second the whole of the car was enveloped. Owing to the high speed at which the car was travelling, half-a-mile was covered before Barlow, by running off the track into soft ground, was able to pull up.

Both occupants jumped clear and escaped injury, but the car was completely burnt. The race also had an exciting finish, Captain Wolseley winning on the post from H. W. Cook, at ninety-nine miles per hour.

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George Duller, the well-known steeplechase jockey, in his first race as an actual driver, won by the length of the finishing straight, at 75 m.p.b.
