

SURREY'S USUAL BLACKHEATH TASK

Fine Batting by Woolley—Bowlers' Day on Wet Wickets—Essex in Trouble.

ANOTHER GLAMORGAN COLLAPSE.

A sticky wicket and Frank Woolley! What a prospect for Surrey to face to-day. Kent made 213 for the loss of 8 wickets between the showers on Saturday and even if the remaining two men give no trouble, Surrey will be "up against it" with a vengeance.

Woolley to the Rescue.—Kent did not make a very auspicious start and half the side were out for 112 when Frank Woolley went in. The great all-rounder, however, played masterly cricket and after scoring his first 50 in 80 minutes was eventually dismissed for 75.

Four Stoppages.—Rain hampered play considerably, four stoppages being made during the afternoon, and stumps were drawn at six o'clock. Aggressive hitting by G. J. Bryan was the feature of the early batting, but he did not last long.

Remarkable Bowling.—There were some splendid bowling performances in the other county games. Cook, of Lancashire, having the best figures of the day with five Glamorgan wickets for 13 runs.

Glamorgan Out for 42.—Glamorgan again failed dismally with the bat, Lancashire dismissing them at Swansea for 42 runs. Parkin and Cook bowled unchanged throughout the innings, and only Morgan, who carried his bat for 13, faced them with any confidence.

Middlesex Centuries.—A splendid third wicket stand by Dales and Hendren laid the foundation of a big Middlesex score at Portsmouth. They put on 230 runs in three hours and twenty minutes.

Derby Doing Well.—After dismissing Worcester for 149, Derbyshire scored 108 for two wickets at Derby. The home county's bowling was varied and difficult. Bestwick, Morton, Storer, Hill-Wood and Cadman all being tried and meeting with success.
