

YORKSHIRE AND THE CHAMPIONSHIP

First Innings Lead Over Essex Necessary to Make Honour Certain—Rhodes' Great Bowling.

TODD BEATS BURNS IN TWELVE ROUNDS

Unless something very unexpected happens, Yorkshire will win the county cricket championship, for a first innings lead over Essex is all that is necessary for them to secure the honour.

Another Hobbs Century.—Surrey gained a fine lead over Middlesex at Lord's, thanks to Jack Hobbs and Ducat. Hobbs scored his ninety-eighth century in first-class cricket—his ninth this season—and altogether he batted three and a half hours.

Lancashire's Failure.—Hampshire gained their first victory over Lancashire since they became a first-class county twenty-seven years ago. They won at Bournemouth in the easiest possible manner by an innings and 54 runs.

Rain the Spoil Sport.—Owing to rain no play at all was possible in the other four matches.
