'In the early betting Sangot and Flint Jack headed the market, but later on there was a rush for Bumble Bee. Finally, Bumble Bee was favourite at fours, and Flint Jack, Sangot and Hunt Law were next in demand.

Ebor Handicap day broke dull and gloomy, but crowds poured into the city and the attendance appeared larger than at any time since the war. The fact that Princess Mary was to accompany Lord Lascelles and the Harewood House party was no doubt an additional attraction. Princess Mary was interested in Sangot's running, but Lord Lascelles' colt failed to run up to expectations.

Lord Lascelles had a narrow escape when Backwood lashed out with his heels during the paddock inspection. Lord Lascelles fortunately escaped injury.

Town Guard turned out for the Convivial Produce Stakes. He had seven opponents, and readily landed the odds that were betted on him. He takes his chance again to day in the "Gimerack."

## FAVOURITES FINISH FOURTH.

Luck continues to smile on the Northumbrian owner and trainer, Mr. Adam Scott. Proud Mary won in his colours at Stockton last week, and a 10th penalty did not stop her from winning the Falmouth Handicap yesterday. Polyhistor was favourite, but could only finish fourth.

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Outsiders, in Sungard, Ad Astra and Flying Eagle, secured the leading positions in the Londesborough Welter. Sungard got nicely away, and was never headed. Ad Astra put in a challenge, but Sungard shook her off, and won by a length. Once again the favourite, Double Bloom, was fourth.

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Apparent made every rost a winning one in the Rous Selling Plate and brought off a 100 to 8 chance for the Penrith stable, and the Yorkshire-trained Nabob repeated last year's success in the Clifton Plate. In the Duke of York Stakes Carslake, on Corcyrian, defeated the well-backed Ludy Juror by half a length. Altogether, the fielders had the best of the argument during the afternoon.

One of the great attractions on the Knavesmire this afternoon will be the race for the "Gimerack," which, apart from its value and the distinction of winning it, affords an opportunity for the owner of the victor to give his opinions on racing reform at the historic dinner of the Gimerack Club later in the year.

America Wins Walker Cup by Eight Matches to Four.

## **EXCITING CONTESTS.**

Winning five of the eight singles on the National Links, Long Island, on Tuesday, America gained a convincing victory over Britain in the amateur golf match for the Walker Cup by eight matches to four. America won three of the four foursome matches played on Monday.

At the end of the first round in the singles honours were easy, says an Exchange message, for each side held a lead in four matches.

The five Americans to win were Jesse Guilford, Bobby Jones, jun., Charles (Chick) Evans, Francis Ouimet and R. A. Gardner.

Guilford defeated Cyril Tolley by 2 and 1, after the Englishman had led by 2 up at the end of the first round.

Jones beat Roger Wethered 3 and 2, and Evans, by steady improvement, defeated John Cavan by 5 and 4. Ouimet easily defeated John Cavan by 5 and 7, and Gardner beat W. M. Torrance by 6 and 5. The closest match of the day was between C. V. L. Hooman and Jesse Sweetser, who were all square at the thirty-sixth, Hooman winning at the thirty-seventh, after some remarkable golf by both players.

The other winning Britishers were W. W. McKenzie, who defeated Max Marston 6 and 6, and Bernard Darwin, who beat Captain W. C. Fownes, jun., 3 and 1.

It was announced that Fownes would be unable to play, but he altered his mind at the last minute and replaced Johnstone.
