Although there was heavy rain in London on Saturday afternoon, fine weather was general in the provinces, and some big crowds saw keenly-contested games in League football. The forty-three games played under the auspices of the Football League attracted some 670,000 spectators.

LONDON'S BIG THREE.

Arsenal Beat Champions and Spurs and Chelsea Win.

A feature of the day was the success attending the efforts of London's three First League ciubs. Arsenal at home and Spurs and Chelsea away all won their matches, a happy augury for a

all won their matches, a happy augury for a good season.

I was particularly pleased with the Arsenal's success. So often last season they seemed to have the fates against them, and so often one had to more or less explain away undeserved defeat, that one can only hope that Dame Fortune will lavish more of her favours Highbury way this season.

Reason.

At any rate, the Arsenal were just a trifle fortunate in beating the champions, for Liverpool played fine football, particularly in the second half, and merited an equaliser.

Rain fell in torrents just before the match started, and the Highbury ground was practically flooded. Arsenal adopted bustling tactics, and swung the ball about. It paid, for they had the best of the exchanges. Voysey in particular at centre-half made splendid openings for his forwards, and if he keeps his form the Arsenal will accomplish big things this season.

Owing to the state of the track the attack on the tandem-paced hour record was reduced to ten miles, and S. Scott, fifty miles champion, won by a lap from W. G. Stewart, who punctured and lost over a lap in changing machines.

British Players Do Well in Qualifying Competition.

A field of about 170 players, including some of the best golfers of America and Britain, began the tournament for the amateur championship of the United States on the course of the Brookline Country Club, Mass., on Saturday in fine weather.

Saturday's qualifying competition was over eighteen holes, and as the result sixty-four players and those tieing for sixty-fourth place qualified to take part in another qualifying test over thirty-six holes to-day, which will eliminate all but thirty-two competitors, who will then compete by match play.

Robert Gardner, (Hinsdale) led the field with a score of 71, which equalled the par of the green. Jesse Guilford (Woodland), the holder, took 74.

Colin Aylmer, one of the English entrants, had a round of 76. The leading British entrant was W. B. Torrance, of Edinburgh, who, with M. A. Greer, tied for second place with 72. Cyril Tolley took 74. Hunter 81. Bernard Darwin and Roger Wethered each took 82.


AUTUMN HANDICAPS.
