DERBY PROSPECTS.

Will Soubriquet Win Breeders' St. Leger?

Racing at Derby was the outstanding feature of yesterday's sport. The weather was overcast and warm, and backers had a good afternoon's entertainment, no fewer than four favourites being successful. Other features of the day were:-

Cricket.—Macaulay scored 67 for Yorkshire against the M.C.C. at Scarborough, the county's total reaching 337.

Golf.—W. I. Hunter won his first-round match in the American amateur championship. Tolley and Torrance, the other two Britishers to qualify, were leading at the end of 18 holes.

DERBY'S OPENING.

Four Favourites Successful at Midland Meeting.

Another St. Leger casualty came to hand yes terday, St. Louis being struck out of the race. The announcement, however, did not cause a great surprise. As stated in these columns yesterday St. Louis had to be shaken up to beat some moderate opponents at Wolverhampton, and in the Great Yorkshire Oaks last week in a field of three he never looked like being even second.

It is the unexpected that happens in racing, and the exit of St. Louis creates an entirely new situation. The stable can send a candidate with some pretensions in Prestongrange. But the latter's owner will also be represented by Fred Power, which is trained for him by Fred Darling. Altogether the wisest course seems to be to let the race alone until the numbers are hoisted in the frame on the eventful day.

Outsiders were a trifle subdued at Derby yesterday and favourites a trifle more rampant. After a brilliant run for backers or layers, however, it generally happens that matters level up. Chief interest was centred in the Champion Breeders' Foal Stakes, and there were flattering reports concerning two of the "dark" division in Kinsman and Americus Boy. They both ran

prominently, but Miltiades, nicely ridden by Beary, was a clever if not an easy winner from Donoghue on Tornaveen.

There was a false start for the opening seller, and most of the horses had a good gallop before they were pulled up. Alderton was favourite, but could only finish fourth, and Polista, who was well backed, made all the running.

In the Breadsall Plate Badnaby was also in front from beginning to end. He was bred by the Duke of Westminster, and has yet to meet with defeat. On the occasion of his debut at Salisbury he made a dead-heat of it with Lady Bountiful gelding. The latter is now known as Lost Ball, and may be saddled for the Elvaston Nursery Plate to-morrow.

Dumas was well supported for the Friary Nursery and the good thing came off, Feltham riding, a brainy race on the winner. Many thought Sunrising had scored, and her jockey took his mount into the enclosure reserved for the winner.



Lady Juror, who will be ridden by Joe Childs, may find a mile and three furlongs a bit too far, and Soubriquet should require a lot of beating. Last time out she conceded Corcyrian Jib. and won cleverly by a head. One must not forget that Corcyrian is fancied for the St. Leger.

In the Devonshire Nursery good accounts are to hand concerning Galante colt, Mardina, First Cut, Witty and Romagna. Mardina was favourite in the first nursery of the season at Haydock Park on Friday. If there was any reason for the support accorded her she should be dangerous here, but whatever wins has Witty to beat.

Now that the county cricket season is over it is very interesting to turn to the score books of the

Surrey's only defeat was by Kent, who were successful by ten wickets. The two games lost by Yorkshire were those with Notts and Hants. And, summing up the record of Notts, they were beaten by Yorkshire, Surrey, Lancashire, Kent and Middlesex.

Turning to the scores, Surrey compiled 10,006 runs in twenty-three county matches, Yorkshire 9,658 in twenty-ninc fixtures, and Notts 8,943 in

store in twenty-nine natures, and Notes 8,320 to twenty-six engagements.

Surrey had forty-one innings and had an average of just over 35 runs per wicket. Yorkshire had forty-two innings with an average of over 30 runs a wicket, and Notts averaged nearly 26 per wicket in forty-three innings.
