

# BRITISH GOLFERS DOING WELL IN U.S.A.

## Hunter's Victory in First Round of Amateur Championship—Tolley and Torrance Leading.

### FRENCH CHAMPION'S CHALLENGE TO RICE

Four British players—Cyril Tolley, W. B. Torrance, C. C. Aylmer, and W. I. Hunter—qualified for the match play stages of the American amateur golf championship on the Brookline course. Play is taking place over 36 holes and, according to a Reuter message received last night, W. I. Hunter has qualified for the second round.

**Willie Hunter's Victory.**—W. I. Hunter, of Walmer and Kingsdown, played brilliant golf and defeated L. M. Lloyd (Greenwich, Connecticut) by 11 up and 9 to play. W. B. Torrance (Edinburgh Burgess) also did well and established a lead of six holes over R. E. Knepper (Sioux City, Iowa), at the end of the first round.

**Tolley Doing Well.**—Cyril J. H. Tolley, of the Royal and Ancient Club, was seen at his best against F. Newton, a local player, and the Britisher was seven up at the end of the first round. The other Englishman, Colin C. Aylmer, of Ranelagh, was opposed to Francis Oulmer, of Woodland, Mass., and the American was five up at the end of 18 holes.

**"Bobby" Jones Only Square.**—One of the surprises of the early play was the fact that "Bobby" Jones was only square with Beadie, a player whose reputation as a world golfer is utterly swamped by that of the youthful Jones. Guilford, the holder, was 4 up on M. A. Greer at the end of eighteen holes.

**Qualifying Competition.**—In the qualifying competition, W. I. Hunter only just got through after a tie. Cyril Tolley was one of the first to make certain of his place when he came in with a second round of 74 for an aggregate of 148. Torrance took 157 and Colin Aylmer 159. Hunter and others had to play off for three places. His score was 162.

**Wethered's Poor Score.**—It was confidently expected that Roger Wethered would make some amend for his poor round of 83 on Saturday, but he took 81, and an aggregate of 164. Bobby Jones (Atlanta) and Jesse Guilford (Woodland), the holder of the title, headed the list with 144.

**Boys' Golf Championship.**—The second annual golf championship for boys under seventeen

starts to-day at Ascot. The aspirants to the title, which is held by A. D. D. Matheson (Edinburgh), come from all over the kingdom, and there are two foreign competitors—Pierre Maneuvrier (France) and Count de Borchgrave (Belgium). Maneuvrier, a pupil of Arnaud Massy, has been round the St. Jean de Luz course in the low score of 69.

**Competitors at Practice.**—Many of the competitors were out on the course yesterday, and C. D. Williams (Swansea) had a round of 74, while S. T. Odams (Bexhill) did 76. F. C. McLachlan (Inverness) played on the Sunningdale course and had a score of 80.

### WALDEN'S FORM.

**Walden Still "Great."**—Little Fanny Walden, the Spurs' popular outside right, has already shown the form which gained him a cap last year against Wales at Liverpool. His perfect understanding with Seed makes the Spurs' right wing one of the most dangerous in the country, and some of the combination is delightful to watch. Walden has always been a "feature" of the side in the sense that the crowd generally have something to laugh at during the match, to say nothing of the splendid play they have to cheer. At Cardiff last year the huge body of Welshmen present for the Cup-tie between the City and the Londoners found Fanny a most entertaining little person when the sides entered the field.

**Rice Challenged.**—Leon Poutet, the French light-weight champion, has challenged Ernő Rice for the European championship. Rice's manager has declared that if his man wins his contest with Seaman Hall at Liverpool on September 18 he will be prepared to meet Poutet either in England or France. Poutet has deposited 1,000l. with the International Boxing Union.

**Miss James Third.**—Miss Gertrude Ederle won the 500 metres swimming race at Brighton Beach yesterday, says the Central News, in the record time of 7m. 22.1-5s. Miss Helen Wainwright was second and Miss Hilda James, the English champion, third. The last-named was forty yards behind Miss Wainwright. Miss Ederle also broke two other records set up by Miss James' in swimming 300 yards in 5m. 58.2-5s. and 440 yards in 5m. 54.3-5s.

**Another Swimming Champion.**—Yorkshire has produced many fine swimmers, but it is believed there is a youth coming along who will prove one of the fastest men in the water the broad-acre shire has known. This is Kenneth Wilson, of Bradford, who, though only seventeen years of age, has won the Yorkshire 440 yards championship for three years in succession. He gained his third victory at Bradford in the creditable time of 6min. 5sec., those behind him including G. H. Webster (Sheffield), thrice winner of an English championship.

**Athletics' for Hospitals.**—An athletic meeting will be held at Honor Oak Park on Saturday in aid of the London hospitals. Representatives from the Stock Exchange, London banks and insurance offices will compete for a challenge trophy. The whole of the receipts will go to the hospitals, there being no entertainment tax, and tickets may be obtained from any of the "Big Five" London hospitals.

### THE STOCK EXCHANGE.

Markets were irregular to-day, gilt-edged stocks being dull. War Loan 5 per cent. fell to 100. Consols were offered 57 5/8, and Conversion Loan at 73 3/4. Mexican bonds were marked up several points on details of the debt scheme. French 5 per cent. fell to 35 1/2 and German 5 per cent. were 11.

Home rails moved narrowly. Argentines were dull on reported potential Government competition. In Industrials textiles were all better. Lister, 27s. 6d were a feature, and Courtauld rose to 54s. 3d. Most other industrial leaders firmed up, Hudson's Bay being 7 and Bats 90s.
