

# SILURIAN CREATES A BIG SURPRISE AT DERBY

## Lord Derby's Chance of Another St. Leger.

### RAMUS TO COMPETE

### Weights for the Autumn Handicaps Due To-day.

Racing at Derby was again the feature of yesterday's sport. Soubriquet and Lady Juror were expected to fight out the issue for the Breeders' St. Leger, but Lord Derby carried off the spoils with Silurian. The winner is engaged in the Doncaster St. Leger next week, and is considered by many to have an outside chance. Other features of the day were—

**Golf.**—W. I. Hunter was defeated in the American amateur golf championship on the Brook-line course by Jesse Sweetzer.

**Cricket.**—Sutcliffe scored a century for Yorkshire against the M.C.C. at Scarborough, and the champion county placed themselves in a good winning position.

**Gardner Also Scores on Rowardennan at Derby.**

hand, but the weights alone will provide us with plenty of food for reflection.

Will Lord Derby win his third St. Leger with Silurian? At Derby yesterday the Breeders' St. Leger was the attraction, and of the seven starters Irish Battle, My Stars and Silurian are in the Doncaster St. Leger next week.

From the point of view of class Soubriquet dominated the field, and she was an odds on chance. Silurian is a bad starter, but on this occasion Gardner got nicely away when the tapes went up, and he kept up a snery gallop for over a mile. A couple of furlongs from home Lady Juror joined Lord Derby's colt, but Silurian held on to win by a head.

Silurian was receiving 10lb. from Lady Juror, but is considered by some people to have an outside chance in the Doncaster classic. Lord Derby won the St. Leger with Swynford in 1910 and with Keysoe in 1919, and it remains to be seen whether Silurian will add to these successes. Ramus (G. Stern) will represent France.

### DEVONSHIRE NURSERY.

No fewer than twenty-two juveniles went to the post for the Devonshire Nursery, and Gardner again scored on Rowardennan. Galante colt and Witty shared favouritism at sevens, but failed to run up to expectations. The race was run in darkness, and at the distance Crossjack swerved and interfered with Galante colt and Courier. The result was that Rowardennan went to the front to win easily.

We began with a couple of sellers, and in the Loudoun Plate the market operations were confined practically to Aspasia and Mountain Fairy colt. Aspasia would have won at Stockton, but for her saddle slipping, and she now scored easily. Mountain Fairy colt saved the place money, and he should win before the end of the season.

There was plenty of paying out over Aspasia, but the fielders were not nearly so busy after the Chatsworth Plate. Belle-Fille and Golden Age were the leading fancies, but both were beaten out of a place. In the straight Beary was at the head of affairs, but Peter Jones challenged on Marcoero, and won by half a length.

### HINTS FOR TO-DAY.

The Peveril of the Peak Plate invariably attracts a representative entry, and among those at the top of this afternoon's handicap are Tetrabbazia, Sister-in-Law, Stratford, Eaglehawk and Leighton. Nothing, however, appears to stand out with any prominence, which is a compliment to the handicapper.

Last year's hero, Corn Sack, will be running over his favourite course, and, on the principle of "horses for courses," one cannot overlook Humpty Dumpty. Evander is a very good colt, and among the lighter weights a favourite word may be written for Isle of Wight, Lord of Burghley and Aclare. As stated, there is nothing in the race with a very strong claim, but with ordinary luck Evander will take some beating.

The Elvaston Nursery Plate will be quite an interesting race, and Schoolgate, Brown Rajah and Lost Ball read a dangerous trio. Forest Glade, however, can be regarded as a certain nursery winner, whatever her fate this afternoon.

The match in the girls' singles, in which Miss Dearman beat Miss M. Cranfield by 6-4, 11-9, was one of the best of the meeting.

## BOYS' GOLF TITLE.

### Rules Incidents Which Puzzle Youthful Players at Ascot.

Though golf is taboo at most of the schools and the play of the boys is restricted to holiday times, many have attained surprising proficiency, as we saw yesterday, when sixty-four gathered from all parts of the country at Ascot to compete for the juvenile championship.

The course is laid out in the middle of the famous racecourse, with the white rails marking its boundaries, and though short it provides a good test.

The thing that struck one most about the boys—all of whom were under seventeen—was their size. Many of them were young giants, with a mighty punch to propel the ball 200 yards or more.

The youngest competitor was Phillip Norris, aged eleven, from Tunbridge Wells. Of course, he was beaten, but he showed the true golfer's instinct. W. L. Ward, of Acton, was pointed out to me as "a certain boy champion." Though only fourteen, he did the first nine holes in 39, and was unlucky to be 1 down at this stage to R. H. Oppenheimer.

Donald Mathieson, the champion, will undoubtedly have a lot of difficulty to retain his title. Yesterday his iron shots went all astray, and his match with R. Fortescue, of Reading, was square at the fourteenth.

At the fifteenth, when both balls lay within a few inches of the hole and it was clearly a half, Fortescue picked them up, and Mathieson claimed the hole. This unfortunate incident so upset Fortescue that he put his next drive into a bush in front of the tee, and the match was over then.

This was not the only case in which the complex rules caused confusion. One boy lost a hole for grounding his club on a road, and another got his caddie to hold back the branches of a bush to allow him to hit the ball, and, of course, was similarly penalised.

## LIVERPOOL'S BIG WIN.

### Sunderland Beaten 5-1—Great Goal by McKinley.

### DEFEAT FOR CHARLTON.

The outstanding result of last night's six League football matches was the brilliant victory of Liverpool, the champions, over Sunderland at Anfield-road by 5 goals to 1.

Very fast play marked the first half, during which Buchanan scored for the visitors. Liverpool were not in arrears for long, however, for Chambers equalised with a fine shot from thirty yards range, and after Forshaw had put them in front Chambers increased their advantage.

The home team were much the better side in the second half, and after Johnson had put on a fourth goal McKinley scored in most sensational fashion by racing past five players and netting with a great shot.

The other First League game was of an entirely different character. Newcastle and Birmingham playing a goalless draw at St. James' Park. The match was marked by the ordering off of Daws, of Birmingham. Both sets of forwards finished weakly and the goalkeepers were rarely tested.

Barnsley dropped a couple of points at Gigg-lane. Bury winning deservedly by the odd goal in three. Bullock scored for the home team after thirteen minutes with a fast, low shot, and about a quarter of an hour later Smith increased the advantage from a free kick. Hines registered the visitors' only goal from a penalty.

### CHARLTON LOSE AT POMPEY.

Charlton Athletic were the only London team engaged, and they were soundly beaten at Portsmouth by three clear goals. Beedie and Watson scored for Pompey in the first half, and Chorret netted after the interval, when the visitors were completely outclassed. The visiting forwards wasted many opportunities by getting off-side. Millistoun being pulled several times.

Northampton sprung a surprise at Gillingham, where they beat the home team 3-0. Lockett scored twice, and Sealbrook notched the third point. Gillingham struggled hard, but their forwards finished weakly.

The other Southern Third Division match also resulted in a 3-0 victory, Brighton winning at home against Exeter City. Jones, McAllister and Moore were the scorers, and the home team fully deserved their success.
