Drew, playing good golf, was as steady as a rock, and although he lost the first hole of the match he led by four holes at the turn. Carter was not much steadier on the homeward half, and at the end of the first round was 3 holes down.

In the afternoon, however, Carter played some wonderful golf, and at the fifth hole he had not only cleared off his deficit, but was actually leading. He never lost this advantage, and in the end won by the comfortable margin of 4 up and 3 to play.

CIVIL SERVICE CHAMPION.

Remarkable Success for Holderness in Final at Porter's Park.

It is seldom that such a one-sided contest is seen as that in the final round of the Civil Service championship yesterday, but it was hardly surprising that E. W. E. Holderness, the British amateur champion, had a very easy win by 13 and 12, Holderness was opposed to A. Barbour in the final match over thirty-six holes on the Porter's Park course, Radlett, and the champion simply overwhelmed Barbour, and was 9 up at the end of the first round.

CARPENTIER'S EXIT.

Was Ex-Champion's Claim for a Foul Justified?

WANTED, A WHITE HOPE.

It really looks as if we have seen the last of Georges Carpentier as a champion. There is no doubt Siki beat him fairly and squarely, and would do so again if another meeting were arranged.

There is some little difference in the manner in which the great French boxer has made his exit from the championship class from that in which our own title-holder, the popular "Bombardier," relinquished his hold on the honour.

The scream for a foul by Carpentier's partisans is not justified by the film, which shows, norceover, that Siki in the last few rounds at any rate was always his muster. When Wells was beuten by Carpentier at Ghent people were surprised.

I have always been a great admirer of Carpentier, but of his crowd I have never had much regard. I remember the tactics pursued when to all intents and purposes Gumboat Smith beat the Frenchman and lost on a technical foul which might not have been conceded had not Descamps invaded the ring.

One cannot begrudge the victor his due, and Siki is now unquestionably the heavy-weight champion of Europe. We have to find a white hone to beat him, and we are starting all over again with the unsavoury business of finding a white nan with a big enough punch to make his blow effective against a negro's skull. More hands will be broken in the process than Carpentier's, who is at the moment nursing both left and right.

Major Wilson tells me he has arranged for Siki to meet the winner of the Beckett-Moran fight on October 12 at the Albert Hall. The match will be a tremendous draw, but it is unfortunate that it is necessary. It will take place on November 23.

The result of the Carpentier-Siki bout is probably a death blow to the negotiations for a Dempsey-Wills fight in the States.

CARPENTIER'S APPEAL.

The French Boxing Federation at a meeting last night upheld the judge's decision in Sunday's contest giving the victory to Siki on the ground that Carpentier, having been knocked out, abandoned the fight.
