

Big Ascot Money Goes Overseas

ASCOT, Tuesday.

BACKERS were still dry and in funds after the first round of a truly international Ascot.

Two wins for the Aga Khan—both youngsters—and the first two races for Sir Abe Bailey, whom we associate as much with South Africa.

A final success for Frenchman M. Marcel Boussac with Goya II, and that preceded by Tempest II, for absent American owner, Mr. A. K. Macomber. The seventh winning owner lives in Sussex.

Usual shocks for those who relied solely on Derby form, but I expected Goya II to turn the tables on Le Grand Duc, who could only finish fourth behind Full Sail (who had moved right up for a challenge) and Fairford, who flattered once more in the lead. Goya II carried through well. As I feared, the St. James's Palace Stakes was too soon after Epsom for Cash Book.

New rails on the flat side have necessitated a big change at the turn. It seems to make the Old Mill look much

longer now for the "gate" has not been moved, but Sir Gordon Carter assured me it is an optical illusion. "I thought as you did until I had it measured and found it only a yard or two longer," he added.

ONE OF MY 20

FIRST race—first "book" shocks. Sandspire second in the Derby now shorted by Cold Scent who carried 12bs. more. I am glad I included Sir Abe Bailey's winner in my "Twenty to follow" in the "Scout's Guide," for he is engaged in the St. Leger. Weston wished he had been in the Derby and Lawson was more than hopeful today—second favourite at 9-2.

Crouch fell back on Sandspire but had picked up and taken the lead in the straight. Cold Scent worried him out of it. Sandspire spilt a pastern and had to be destroyed. Winner confirmed Eclipse with Redardo.

Cold Scent calls attention to his easy York conqueror, Merry Mathew, but unfortunately the northern crack has a gathering in his off fore foot, and is almost certain not to run for the King Edward VII. Stakes tomorrow. I had anticipated his clash with my Derby "nap" Solo.

SECOND AGAIN

KEPT-ON is the 1937 "Jonah." With the winner out of the way he would have finished first in three big handicaps this year. Weston and Lawson are to get a clear run on the outside and head him on the Ascot Stakes favourite Valerian. I thought in the straight we might be a 25-1 winner in Rondo, but Sir Calidore passed him for third place only three-quarters of a length more away, and also turned Chester Cup form on the prominent fifth Faites Vos Jeux.

Mrs. Grundy lasted longer than the leading Cornered and Farsighted. Fancied Fit was bucking at the start and laboured behind most of the way. The King's Fairlead dropped further back.

Frank Butters has been rather quiet with his juveniles, but he landed the double of the Coventry and Queen Mary Stakes. Queen of Simla—a 20-1 chance—turned Newmarket form on the very prominent Prosecutor and held Keipie by a neck with the much-improved Soda another short head just in
