WIN AT EDINBURGH

GREAT doings in Scotland to-day. The King and Queen visit Edinburgh races and, more to the point, it is highly probable that they will hear the royal colours cheered to victory for the first time.

Jubilee and Curraghmore have already won races for the King, but on each occasion they have done so in the absence of their royal owner.

Felstone and Sanctorum are the runners to-day—the former being selected for the Summer Handicap in preference to Polonaise and the two-year-old for the Glenfuir Plate instead of Foxbrush, who once finished second to Mirza II.

Apart from Gentle Lily the opposition to Felstone does not appear formidable, and as Evening Dun does not oppose the two-year-old, J. Crouch has a reasonably good chance of a double in successive races.

E. Smith and Maher will be among the jockeys riding at Edinburgh. Gordon Richards deserts Lingfield for his lucky Chepstow, where Outbreak and Ellen's Isle may keep his score peg moving. Not a single horse goes from Lambourn to Lingfield, and only fifteen have left Newmarket.

One of these is Miss Dorothy Paget's 11,500 guineas Radiant, but the filly will probably give way to Egeria colt in the Foal Plate if the ground remains firm.

In the race there was only one in it. With a furlong to go Pascal was sent to the front, and there he stayed to win by a very easy four lengths. Matopo Hill, Light o' Love and Senior were equally obliging, and although Rose of Margate failed to justify "evens," the victory of Mania spoilt many a book. Nine-year-old Light o' Love kept the veterans' flag flying by winning the Summer Handicap for the second year. Curious how these old stagers do not seem to worry about hard ground so much as their juniors.

Fairplay's Next Race

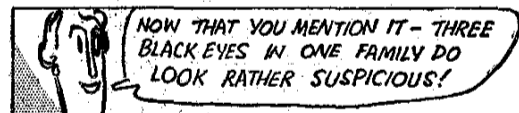

TOTE'S £7,367,925

The annual report of the Betting Control Board shows that the total turnover from totalisators on racecourses last year amounted to £7,367,925, an increase of nearly 20 per cent. over the total in 1935. The totalisator was operated on 552 racing days (forty less than in 1935) at meetings licensed by the Jockey Club and the National Hunt Committee; at 144 point-to-point meetings and on eighty-one days at racecourses licensed by the Pony Turf Club. The report reveals that during the year £90,361 was spent in connection with buildings. Of this sum £80,000 went towards the expenditure incurred by the Ascot authority in 1930 in connection with the provision of totalisator accommodation at the racecourse.
