COLLAPSE IN THE PRICE FOR TIN

The latest collapse on Wall Street has thoroughly upset commodity and metal markets. Tin fell £7 per ton to £173 7s. 6d.

I was told of one seller of 700 tons of tin. There seems to be no object in holding while New York is in such a state of collapse.

Another disquieting factor is a postponement of the Tin Regulation Committee meeting which was to be held on April 5. It is believed that divergent views concerning the formation of a buffer pool are behind the postponement.

RUBBER FALLS TO STILL LOWER LEVEL

Spot rubber took another dip to 54d, followed by a modest rally to 54d, per lb. This is the lowest price since September, 1935.

It follows keen disappointment with the absence of any further cut in the rubber output for the second quarter of this year. The position now depends largely on American consumption, which, I am afraid, is a broken reed.
