

NAZIS' 500 NEW 'PLANES A MONTH

Germany already has 2,000 or 3,000 more warplanes than Britain ; she is now building 500 'planes a month and, when the new factory in Austria is completed, will be able to produce 600 a month-more than double Britain's rate of production.

WARNING of this menace to Britain was given last night by Mr. Robert Boothby, Conservative M.P. for Aberdeen and Kincardine, E., speaking at New Deer, Aberdeenshire.

Unless Britain acted quickly he said, Ger-many's air superiority would within a year be overwhelming enough for her to deliver a knock-out blow to Britain.

"Such a position cannot be tolerated," said Mr. Boothby.

"The sooner we place orders in Canada and the United States for at least 2.000 machines with more to follow, the better.

"Once again I may be a voice crying in the wilderness, but if the people of this country imagine they are secure, they are living in a fools' paradise," he declared.

The U.S. Government, it was reported in Washington yesterday, expects an inquiry from Britain about the possibility of early delivery of 1,000 warplanes.

At the same time, France is reported to be inquiring about 600 military machines, says British United Press.

# SECOND 'QUAKE FEAR

Hundreds of farmers and farm workers in Turkey, facing starvation after one of the country's worst earthquakes, are risking their lives by going back to their land. "It will be terrible if there are any more tremors," the British Embassy at Angora told the *Daily Mirror* by transcontinental tele-phone yesterday. "They will be wiped out." About 50,000 villagers are homeless, most of them starving. Two hundred bodies have been recovered and hundreds are reported missing.

### ONE IN 14 NEEDS TREATMENT FOR MENTAL DISORDER


