# NAZIS' 500 NEW 'PLANES A MONTH

Useless Eustace

Germany already has 2,000 or 3,000 more warplanes than Britain; she is now building 500 planes a month and, when the new factory in Austria is completed, will be able to produce 600 a month—more than double Britain's rate of production.

WARNING of this menace to Britain was given last night by Mr. Robert Boothby, Conservative M.P. for Aberdeen and Kincardine, E., speaking at New Deer, Aberdeenshire.

Unless Britain acted quickly he said, Germany's air superiority would within a year be overwhelming enough for her to deliver a knock-out blow to Britain.

"Such a position cannot be tolerated," said Mr. Boothby.

"The sooner we place orders in Canada and the United States for at least 2,000 machines with more to follow, the better.

"Once again I may be a voice crying in the wilderness, but if the people of this country imagine they are secure, they are living in a fools' paradise," he declared.

The U.S. Government, it was reported in Washington yesterday, expects an inquiry from Britain about the possibility of early delivery of 1,000 warplanes.

At the same time, France is reported to be inquiring about 600 military machines, says British United Press.

## SECOND 'QUAKE FEAR

Hundreds of farmers and farm workers in Turkey, facing starvation after one of the country's worst earthquakes, are risking their lives by going back to their land.

"It will be terrible if there are any more tremors," the British Embassy at Ankara told the Daily Mirror by transcontinental telephone yesterday. "They will be wiped out."

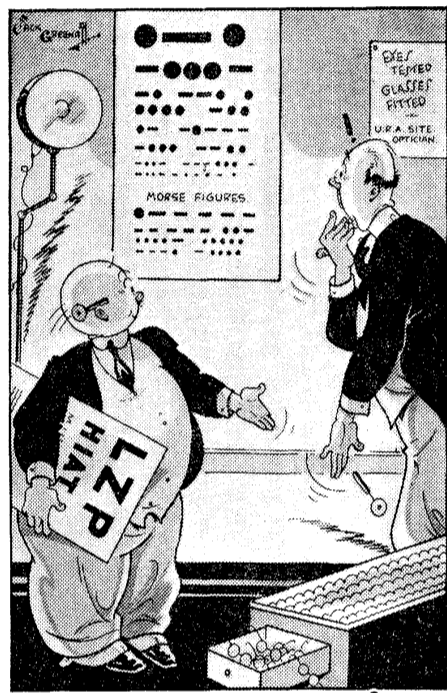
About 50,000 villagers are homeless, most of them starving. Two hundred bodies have been recovered and hundreds are reported missing.

## ONE IN 14 NEEDS TREATMENT FOR MENTAL DISORDER

One person in fourteen of the whole population is in need of treatment, which would be largely psychological, for some forms of mental disorder.

Dr. J. R. Rees said this yesterday when, at the Ideal Home Exhibition, he stressed the need for securing mental fitness.

During the last twenty or thirty years, he said, a revolution in medicine had been taking place, and recently we had been coming to "human medicine," realising that personality and emotional strains in the life of an individual played a very large part in the production of disorder and disease.

### Preparing for Marriage

"Personal problems of mental fitness are always in front of us," declared Dr. Rees. "We need much more honesty and far franker criticisms of ourselves and our own kinks and peculiarities.

"If we can make friends with fear instead of being ashamed of it, if we can be more friendly with our sexual instinct and so manage it more wisely, we shall have made considerable progress towards our goal."

There were certain things the securing of which were worthy of great effort—better preparation for marriage; better education for parents about the upbringing of their children; wise early management of children's difficulties.

## WELLS LOSES THE ALLOWANCE

G. Wells, who is apprenticed to J. Russell's stable, lost the right to claim the 5lb allowance when he won the Carleton Handicap on Ambassador Boy at Pontefract yesterday.

GOOD things had come up with such unflinching regularity that the defeat of Olympus in the Blue Riband Trial Stakes made Epsom's last day crowd rub its eyes with amazement.

Many thought him unlucky not to have beaten Mirza II at Newbury. Even if his defeat was taken strictly as it stood, he did look a good thing to beat four opponents, of which the best was apparently True Mate.

There was no excuse for him this time. Only Jubilee Day, a long way last, finished behind him. True Mate was beaten easily by both Chatsworth and Malabar.

Such a decisive defeat for Olympus is a bad "let down" for Mirza II, even allowing that the Aga Khan's colt was conceding 12lb, when he beat him at Newbury.

Continued absence of rain might still give the Aga Khan's flyer an advantage over many of his Guineas rivals next Wednesday, but yesterday's result will cause many to turn to his stable companion, Tahir.

Those who saw the finish between Mendicant Friar, Bookseller and Asterion are not likely to forget the first race for the Brown Jack Stakes.

There were only four runners, but three of them were in almost a dead line for the last 300 yards. Each in turn appeared to gain a slight advantage, and it was almost in the last stride that Tommy Weston forced Mendicant Friar's head in front of his stable companion.

### Trainer's Luck Turns

It was certainly the best finish of the three days, and there was almost a "Derby roar" as they fought it out.

Captain Boyd-Rochfort's luck turned at length when Fizz gained a comfortable victory in the Westminster Stakes. The youngster is owned by Mr. J. H. Whitney, who was present on a racecourse for the first time this season.

Sansalvo, from the same string, runs at Sandown to-day in the Twickenham Handicap, and if the stable luck has really turned he will not be far away after his good show against Nosegay and Bacardi at Kempton.

Still, it is not a good thing for him to beat the Newbury Cup winner, Carlisle, who, I am told, has done particularly well since
