The Hurdler

YESTERDAY the time-honoured Epsom Derby topped the bill. To-day many of those who have been Pound Foolish over the gee-gees will wish to be penny wise before they have completely gone to the dogs.

That thriving infant, the Greyhound Derby, grows tremendously in interest every year and to-day the draw will be made at the Savoy Hotel. On the luck of the draw rests the hopes of many owners who have been striving for years to land the richest prize dog racing has to offer.

You can have the best greyhound ever whelped, but you still need good luck for your dog to win a Derby.

The final closing stage was on Tuesday. No sensational last-minute entries had been expected, although some new stars have been imported from Eire.

The rule which calls for three races in this country before greyhounds are eligible for the Derby has prevented eleventh-hour swoops on the big prize.

UNTIL the draw has been made there is not much chance of being able to weigh up the prospects of the outstanding entrants accurately.

I have already stated that I think highly of Grosvenor Bob's chances of success and I see no reason to hedge just yet.

There is a prevalent idea that Jim Syder has been unwise in bringing his Derby hope to a high pitch in his training much too soon.

Many people think that Grosvenor Bob is sure to go stale before the Derby final. As this greyhound has broken two national records within the past month that notion is quite rea-

sonable if you don't know that his trainer is fully alive to the dog's state of fitness.

There are not many wiser heads in the training business than Jim Syder. He made no mistake last year when he said he would win the Derby with Wattle Bark. He now knows that Grosvenor Bob can be improved upon still further in his preparation, which is being timed to a nicety.

We have had several races in which the leading Derby dogs have had pipe-openers, and it is fairly evident that they can all show improvement by the time the first round of the Derby is run to-morrow week.

Ballyhennessy Sandhills has not yet been seen at full stretch this season. Wattle Bark has not had a race over the course and it is probable that Manhattan Midnight can be keyed up to knock a few hundredths off his best time.

There is also Bealtaine in the background as a very dark horse. This greyhound would have been seen in the Grand National if he had not injured himself in a trial when he caught the hare.

Joe Harmon had hopes that a few races over

nurdles would help Bealtaine immensely in his Derby preparation and it was sheer bad luck to have the dog injured. In spite of that I expect to see Mr. Flintham's second string do well.

Harmon also has Junior Classic and as this fine youngster has already won the Gold Collar his chances must not be overlooked.

The fact that Wattle Bark was unplaced in the Gold Collar final can be ignored when considering his chance of winning his second Derby. The Catford track is not the White City by a long shot.

As I shall have another opportunity of fully discussing the Derby prospects before the first heats are run I leave the subject with the remark that if you can get a nice long price about Grosvenor Bob it is an opportunity not to be missed.

If he can break two national records when his preparation is nothing like complete, what will he do when trained to perfection?



I see no reason to hedge about Grosvenor Bob's chance.

THE Laurels is Wimbledon's counterpart to the Derby and it holds almost as much interest for the greyhound enthusiast.

For the past two years Mrs. J. F. Cearns, wife of Wimbledon's managing director, has won the event with greyhounds bought from Ireland with that idea.

She has been fortunate in having as her scout one of the best judges of a greyhound in Ireland, namely, Billy Quinn. It was on the advice of Billy Quinn that Mrs. Cearns bought Top of the Carlow

Road, winner of the 1936 Laurels.

Last year Mr. Flintham nursed a warm hope of winning the Laurels with Bealtaine, and there is no doubt that he would have succeeded if Quinn had not spotted Ballyhennessy Sandhills just in the nick of time to complete the purchase and send him over for the Laurels in which he beat Bealtaine by a neck.

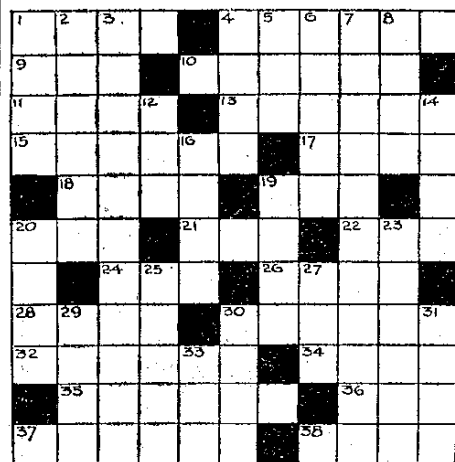
Now we are approaching another Laurels meeting and history is repeating itself. Mr. Flintham scored over Billy Quinn in beating him to the post to buy Barryreel.
