A N extraordinary demand still persists for gold on the London market.

The buying comes almost entirely from the Continent. It really is a reflection of the highly nervous state of affairs existing there on account of European politics.

The theory is that gold is far safer to hold in the event of war than either securities or foreign currencies.

BROKERS REPORT A TERRIFIC DEMAND

Gold worth £1,816,000 changed hands during the "fixing" in London yesterday morning. Bullion brokers spoke of a keen "safety first demand from the Continent.

Further supplies were acquired during the afternoon Some of the gold buying was of a purely speculative character.

It was seen that the dollar rate of exchange was steadily improving against sterling. That of course, meant a higher price for gold and many visualised a profit on a purchase before the day was out
