Bumper trouble

THE Government's Bill to clamp-down on "luxury" private building emerged yesterday - not as the expected emergency step but as a permanent control plan.

It will be a criminal offence to carry out such work without licence. Penalties of up to two years jail and a fine are to be imposed.

Minister of Public Bluiding and Works, Mr. Charles Pannell, is seeking powers to vary the controls by Order.

Priority

Thus he would be able to change the cost limit of £100,000 at which controls begin if conditions change.

But he will have to get the go-ahead from Parliament for any order making controls even tougher.

The Government's line is that urgent, industrial building, development district works—must get priority.

Efforts are being made to boost the building industry's output. But when it cannot meet all demands Mr. Panuell wants to be sure that luxury projects do not mop up the bricks and labour.

About 500 projects costing £180 million—about seven per cent on new building—are expected to be hit by the licensing scheme in the next year.

Liable for prosecution are: The building owner or developer, the contractor, or architects, engineers and surveyors supervising work.

But it will be a defence for these to prove that they had reasonable grounds to believe that money limits would not be exceeded or conditions broken.
This is an important loophole in a period of soaring costs.
The Bill does not apply to repairs, maintenance, or redecoration. But it covers all aiterations.
It is retrospective, but no act done before it becomes law will be made criminal.

BUSIER **BRITAIN BOOSTS OVERTIME WORK**

By TREVOR EVANS

NEW facts reveal that Britons have been busier than expected in the second half of this

year.

An annual count of National Insurance cards shows that since June, the total number of workers in civil employment has been 0.4 per cent greater than a Government provisional estimate.

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By the end of the four months up to mid-October there were 30,000 more men and 87,000 more wemen in jobs—making a total national workforce of 24,571,000.

Ministry of Labour figures indicate that the October workforce fell by 24,000 compared with mid-September, but this was mainly because of seasonal induences.

More evidence of bustling Britain comes from the Ministry's overtime returns.

In mid - October 2,202,000 operatives—or 36 per cent of all comployed in the manufacturing industries—were working overtime. And on average they were putting in an extra eight and a laif hours a week.

This estimate of workers on overtime was 93,000 more than in September.
